CRIME

In last month's FYI, I wrote about a wave of night time burglaries and a number of street robberies. While I can't go into very much detail because of the investigation, there is good news to report. Chief Robshaw has authorized me to say that there have been several arrests in conjunction with these crimes and since these arrests, there have been no additional night time robberies. As I reported in the September Newsletter, there have been arrests with most of the street robberies as well. There is still an ongoing investigation of all these crimes as well as a recent car jacking and Chief Robshaw has been getting good cooperation and information from the County Police Department. The calls Chief has received from citizens have definitely been very helpful in these cases, so residents are urged to continue to call even if something just seems "odd" or trivial. Interested citizens may want to attend the 7 PM October 2nd C-PACT meeting (Citizens and Police Together). Chief's FYI is also in this FYI. In addition, there is a \$1000 reward being offered for information that leads to arrests in any of these cases. Chief is working on establishing a tip line, but in the meantime, residents can call 773-8362.

WARD 1 COUNCIL SEAT OPEN

Sadly, Ward 1 Councilmember Stephen Hofmann will be vacating his Council seat sometime in November as he, his wife Angela and their children will be moving to Arkansas later this year. In addition to his duties as Councilmember, Stephen has also been a member of the Zip Code Task Force and the Cheverly Metro Task Force. He will be working on Town business right up until the bitter end, attending the September Worksession and October Special Worksession, Town Meeting and October Worksession.

As is the practice, the Council will be appointing a resident to this seat. This individual would serve out Stephen's term and then could run for election in the upcoming May Town election. If you are interested, send a resume to the Town Administrator (specifics are elsewhere in this newsletter). Being on Council takes a great deal of time and dedication with a minimum of two, often three, long meetings each month as well as other meetings and hearings---not to mention many, many phone calls. It is very rewarding so again, if you are interested, call the Town Administrator at 773-8360 or send in your resume and a cover letter as to why you would like to be considered for appointment.

PEPCO OUTAGE

We are following up with Pepco for a written status report on our questions from their recent Town Meeting visit. There has been improvement since their last visit but Council and I want to continue to stay on top of these issues. While we have been tough on Pepco, the recent Town wide outage we had this past weekend was not their fault. During the September 24th Redskin game no less, most of the Town, including the apartments and Giant Shopping Center lost power when a contractor hired by a resident cut down a tree. The tree fell on top a major feeder line and most of us lost power. While the contractor was knocked from the ladder, luckily he was not electrocuted or burned. Pepco had power back up in two hours---two very frustrating hours for Skins fans and everyone else. I have been asked to remind residents to only use licensed tree experts when having trees removed or trimmed and to use caution when doing this work themselves.

THE POINTE AT CHEVERLY

Many residents have been asking about the status of the development of the Route 450 property, now called the Pointe at Cheverly. While things are going slower than hoped there is good news to report. In this newsletter, there is a section with elevations, sample floor plans and diagrams so Cheverly residents can truly see what is being planned.

The Pointe at Cheverly is being developed by Stepping Stones Development, LLC and Republic Land Development, LLC in conjunction with Cheverly and The Prince George's Redevelopment Authority. These developers have been involved with a number of quality developments around the

region including the Market Square project on Pennsylvania across from the National Archives. Our project has been difficult and very complicated but certainly worth the time, effort and money. Earlier in the summer, Council and I were concerned when we learned that the number of the larger units for the Point had been decreased and the smaller units proportionately increased. We invited Bill Youngblood from Stepping Stones to attend a Worksession and catch the Council up on the latest developments. Both he and a number of individuals from Republic and also Morris & Ritchie Associates came and did a lengthy, informative presentation. (I want to thank Morris & Ritchie for putting this layout together for the newsletter.) I would just like to say that Council and I were reassured and feel that it is a beautiful plan and design that will enhance our Town in every way.

While it is true that the ratio of one bedrooms to two bedrooms and one bedroom/den has increased, Council was told that this is not a reflection of our County or the neighborhood, but very much in line with middle and upper income areas in Northern Virginia, Washington, D.C., and Maryland. Currently there are 126 one bedroom units, 29 one bedroom/den and 89 two bedrooms for a total of 244 units. At the time of the meeting, it was estimated that the average selling price for these units will be about \$350,000. Republic hopes to have financing squared away soon and plans to begin selling this spring. This is a very expensive project and could not have been undertaken without the involvement and most importantly, money, invested by the Prince George's County Redevelopment Authority, but this has also led to some delays. County Executive Jack Johnson has indicated that he feels this is a very important project. Many hurdles with zoning and other aspects had to be overcome and for this we owe County Councilmember David Harrington a big "thank you".

It is a beautiful project that has taken advantage of the unusual and challenging hilly site. All the finishes are high quality with hardwood cabinets and stainless steel appliances in the kitchens and tiled bathrooms. Walls of oversized windows and bay windows anchor the unique floor plans. Each unit has washer and dryers and individual security systems.

There is a beautiful circular entrance with a central fountain as approached from Route 450. The two-story lobby leads to the fitness center, a large family room, media and meeting rooms with catering capabilities and entrances to the private pool. There are a total of five elevators from the parking garages so that residents can park safely and have direct access to their condominium. We will have more information for residents as we approach spring.

OCTOBER TOWN MEETING

Council will be voting on designating Pinky's Park as a Peace Park. Joyce Lang and the Woman's Club have asked us to consider this and have made several presentations to the Council. An article appears elsewhere in this newsletter.

We will also be discussing paper vs. mechanical voting machines for the upcoming May Town elections.

We will also be discussing, and perhaps voting on a project outside of Town called Addison Row at Cheverly Metro. At the September Town meeting, the Cheverly Planning Board presented an excellent report to the Council and Council decided to ask that a M-NCPPC hearing regarding the rezoning of this property be postponed or we would be forced to oppose the rezoning. Just this past Thursday, we learned that our request had been granted. This gives us time to look at this request in depth and get more information out to residents. A special Worksession with the developer has been tentatively set for early October. Councilmember Schachter and I met with the Ward 4 Civic Association and Councilmember Oslik met with the Cheverly Planning Board concerning this large 34.4 acre proposed development.

Message from the Chief

CRIME IN CHEVERLY - The last few months have produced several spikes in crime in various parts of the Town. We are not alone in this activity, as the county has faced very similar issues and a recent FBI report indicates that there has also been a rise in violence recently in the United States for the first time in almost 4 years. As many of you may be aware, the Metropolitan Police Department of Washington, DC recently declared a crime emergency because of escalating homicides and robberies. Our principal problems have been contained to two areas—robberies in the vicinity of the apartments along Landover Road and burglaries in the single-family homes along the west side of Cheverly Ave.

Regarding citizen robberies, July and early August produced a dramatic rise in this particular crime that was almost equal to the total for the first 5 months combined. There were 2 commercial and 6 citizen robberies along Landover Road, and a citizen robbery that was initiated at the Metro station off Columbia Park Road. What looked like a veritable crime wave was in fact the work of one adult and a number of juveniles. The adult male was responsible for one of the commercial robberies and was ultimately arrested by the County Police after forensic examination of evidence left on the scene identified the accused.

Regarding the six citizen robberies on Landover Road, a Cheverly juvenile resident has been identified and charged with these robberies and a number of others in the general area outside of Cheverly. And regarding the robbery at the Metro, this crime was also perpetrated by a Cheverly juvenile resident and an area friend. All of these cases are currently pending court action and all of these cases were closed because of outstanding investigative work by the Cheverly Police Department (CPD). Regarding the recent night-time burglaries, one of which was also classified as a residential robbery, the CPD has obtained a number of fingerprints from these crimes, has

identified a number of important witnesses, and is currently working very hard toward closing these crimes by arrest in the next few weeks. In the interim, it is critical that town residents assist the CPD in several important ways:

1. Please be sure to lock or secure all doors to your residence and all windows within 6 feet of the ground. The CPD has reason to believe that the suspects in these crimes are looking for open doors/windows and bypass houses that are well secured.
2. Please be sure to leave front and rear house lights on during all hours of darkness. The CPD recommends fixtures with photo-electric cells that automatically turn on lights at dusk and off at dawn. Fluorescent fixtures are best, but 3-5 year incandescent light bulbs (no spot light bulbs) work very well. Be leery of motion detectors because they are not hard to detect.
3. Trim back heavy bushes away from the house and reduce the likelihood that suspects could use these bushes as cover.
4. Call Police Communications (301-333-4000) immediately if you see anyone suspicious in your backyard, alley, or the private property of your neighbors. These suspects may avoid detection or observation by using backyards, nearby woods, paths, or alleys to navigate around Town.
5. Please, take the time to write down the product serial number on every item bearing such a number in the home. This is especially true for lap top computers, cameras, electric game stations (X box, Play Station, etc.) items that are frequently stolen in these crimes. Keep this list hidden away but available in the event of a theft.
6. Women in particular, please make it a habit of securing your purse or wallet before retiring for the evening. Burglars and thieves look for such items in particular because of the cash they may contain.
7. When returning to Cheverly at night by vehicle, take the time to ride around the block once or twice to make sure no one is following. Carjackers (usually 2 or 3) in particular like to follow vehicles occupied by a lone driver and then commit the carjacking when the driver parks at home. If you do notice such a vehicle following, please call 9-1-1.
8. Sign up for a Ride-Along with the CPD. Ride-Alongs are not show-and-tell, but instead, are design to enhance the effectiveness of the police officer with the local knowledge and observation skills of a resident.
9. Finally, sign up for a free home safety inspection. This inspection is performed as a free service by the CPD, usually takes about an hour, and usually results in recommendations that generally cost less than \$200 (including some doors). Upon passing this inspection, the homeowner receives a beautiful red and white Cheverly and Home Burglary Anti-Partnership plaque that is mounted in one of the home's front windows.

ELECTRONIC MESSAGE BOARD - Many of you got your first look at CPD's new electronic message board at National Night Out and you may have already seen it deployed on the streets of the Town. This message board will be used in conjunction with CPD's enforcement efforts, public safety and traffic orientations, and as a means to get important crime information out to the public quickly.

REWARD MONEY - The CPD is committed to using every means necessary to close out open investigative case. In line with this, the Town is offering rewards up to \$1,000.00 for information that leads to the identification of any person committing a crime in Cheverly, with particular attention to the crimes of robbery, burglary, and theft from auto. In the short-term, please call the office or leave a message on the answering machine. In the near future, the CPD will establish a cellular Tip Line to make communications much quicker and add more confidentiality.

COMPUTER ISSUES - The CPD does quote a bit of redundant paperwork daily regarding impound notifications to vehicle owners and the court. Daily we must send out certified mail to vehicle owners, lienholders, insurance companies, and the District Court of Maryland as required by Maryland law. Each of these instances now requires a duplicate effort to accomplish and I have become convinced there must be a better way. Anyone with any knowledge of how we can streamline this procedure is certainly encouraged to call me at CPD (301-773-8362).

Trees are Profitable to your home and community.

The Town of Cheverly Public Works Department is preparing a list with names and addresses and you can be on it. This list will have the names and address of individuals who have called Public Works requesting a tree to be planted on their property at no cost to them, except for the requested weekly five gallon bucket of water. Planting a tree is profitable. A tree can:

- Increase the value of your home 15% or more
