



FACTORING IN COVID-19

- In-person workshop originally planned to solicit community vision
- Online survey accessed by yard signs with QR codes & weblink
- Town website with survey link
- Initial survey consists of a few questions on how park is used
- Later survey voting on precedent (idea) images for programming
- Consider postcard survey with information to include/help non-internet users
