This next year promises to be quite busy for our family, and we are fortunate to have our own Cheverly network to support us through all the crazy schedules and last-minute needs that are part and parcel of so many of our lives. Remember to "Make new friends but keep the old. One is silver, and the other is gold."

#### Where is the "Year in Review?"

I anticipate that many of you are missing the "Year in Review," as am I, and I promise to work for its return. I always appreciated Mayor Mike's wrap up of the accomplishments from the previous year, and I look forward to working with our new Town Administrator, Public Works Director, and Chief of Police to bring back that tradition for this next year. Here's to a full roster!

#### Cheverly in 2019—many thanks owed to staff.

This past year was one of transitions, processes, and patience. It took nine months, multiple closed meetings, interim and acting positions, and three lengthy, multistep selection processes that spanned Mayor and Council elections before we were finally able to fill each of our three Town leadership positions. At times, the process was incredibly intense, but we made it through! I remain personally and professionally grateful for the support and leadership Interim Town Administrator David Deutsch offered us throughout his time with the Town. It is not the least bit of an exaggeration to say that we could not have successfully weathered such a significant transition

without him. I also am grateful for how our staff continued to put forward their best level of service in such a time of uncertainty.

### Cheverly in 2019—gratitude for former and current colleagues and you!

As Mayor, and having served on Council previously for nine years, I must also acknowledge that this process required an immediate and extraordinary lift from newly-elected public servants. No councilmember could reasonably be expected to understand the intensity and demands this responsibility would require. To the new Council—thank you for sticking with! Another thank you goes to former Councilmember Eldridge and former Mayor Callahan—you have never failed to answer staff and my calls. You have always done your best to honor requests to search your memories or bridge gaps in staff and my knowledge. Please keep answering the phone. Most of all, I thank you, the wonderful residents of Cheverly, for your patience, your kindness, and for respecting us enough to stay invested and hold us accountable. Cheverly residents are a forever expanding, evolving, extraordinary, testimony to a commitment to creating a diverse and inclusive community that embraces, uplifts, and affirms the contributions of all of us.

### Cheverly in 2020—a year of opportunity and individual and shared responsibility

These past many months have left staff leaders and Mayor and Council with both great opportunity and immense responsibility. These past months have also left their scars. As we engage needed reviews of dated policies and operations, we cannot ignore that our Town has lost (continued on next page)

more than 20 years of institutional knowledge as well as a formidable know-how and work ethic. Our Town Administrator, Mr. Galloway, runs the day-to-day operations of the Town. As Mayor, I regularly meet with our Town Administrator and Public Works Director and Chief of Police to support and inform their work in meeting the needs of our Town, and best serve our residents. Cheverly may be geographically small, but our Town serves many needs, and all of us like to feel that our questions and concerns receive a personal response and a timely follow-up. Our new staff leaders are learning just how much they need to accomplish in both daily operations and supervision and longer-term planning and projects. Staff leaders are also realizing the degree to which their roles require them to be present and accessible to you, the residents of our Town. Balancing these responsibilities is difficult, but this next year will be smoother and more productive with a full team on board. Please let us know when we get things right and help us correct when we fall short of the mark.

### Mayor and Council 2019 into 2020—an intense year and opportunities ahead.

I, as Mayor, and your Councilmembers must face our challenges if we are to be ready for the opportunities and responsibilities 2020 will present our Town. Our first nine months were of such an intensity that I believe many Councilmembers were (rightfully) left emotionally drained and exhausted. These past few months have been busy but, thankfully, not as intense, and I hope that we can engage the new year with a readiness for the extra worksessions and budget and policy discussions that lie ahead for us in the new year.

# Kicking off the new year as Mayor and Council—facilitate, train, plan, repeat!

I am firmly committed to a collaborative, cooperative, and consensus-building approach to leadership in the service of our Town. I have learned that engaging this approach sometimes requires setting aside time for team/trust-building. My initial goal was a spring/summer Mayor and Council

retreat and that we follow our retreat with a formal strategic planning process. The reality of the tasks and timeline before us first delayed us, and later, individual schedules conflicted with engaging a retreat before the end of the year. I am thankful that everyone was able to identify a date and that we will begin 2020 with a facilitated Mayor and Council retreat on Saturday, Jan. 4, from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm. Our retreat will support us in reorienting from the intensity of this past year to preparing ourselves as a team to meet the opportunities and responsibilities of this next year. Please rest assured that I am working with Town Administrator Galloway on the next steps of prepping for strategic planning and meeting our municipal budgeting training needs. Here's to plenty of good work ahead in the new year!



#### Cheverly's Mass Notification System is here!

CodeRED allows residents to receive emergency alerts via text, email, or phone call. Upon signing up for the service, users can create a Managed Account, which allows the user to create a username and password and control the following:

Types of alerts received:

Emergency Alerts (Mandatory) General Alerts (Optional) Weather Alerts (Optional, as provided by the National Weather Service) Method alerts are received: Via text message

> Via email Via phone call

Users can also perform a quick signup however, doing so would require the user to call CodeRED's customer service line in order to make any changes to the account.

Users are required to have either a residential or business address, within the Cheverly limits, in order to sign up for an account. The system supports multiple addresses, phone numbers, and emails.

#### Residential ZONE Parking Permits

- You must have Vehicle Registration (registered to Cheverly address) to register your vehicle
- Parking Permits cost \$5 / 1 Guest Parking Permit allowed per residence at no cost.
- \$2 for an additional Guest Parking Permit (maximum of 2 guest permits per residence)

#### If you live in one of the following zones, you will need a parking permit:

[This permit allows senior citizens 65 years of age or older to park their car in this area in order to utilize Metro].

#### Residential Parking Permits are displayed on the BACK LEFT bumper area.

If you have a regular zone permit and a SR permit display them next to each other on the back left bumper.

#### Guest Parking Permits shall be hung on Rear View mirror with information facing outward.

Citations may be issued to any vehicle not in compliance with Town Code 27-5.1: "Residential Zone Parking" If you should have any questions, please contact the Photo Enforcement Unit at 240-770-7641.

#### WINTER WEATHER REMINDERS

TOWN CODE - Sec. 27-10—Parking

A snow emergency shall exist whenever snow has accumulated on the streets to a depth of one (1) inch or more.

The provisions of this subsection shall be effective without any notification and shall remain in effect until the street is plowed; provided, however, that when snow shall accumulate to a depth of one inch or more after 11:00PM, the provisions of this subsection shall not be effective until 7:00AM the day following and shall remain in effect until the street is plowed.

# PARKING RESTRICTIONS: During a snow emergency no person shall park any vehicle as follows:

- On the cul-de-sac portion of any street,
- On any courts,
- On the even-numbered side of all streets,
- (exception) On the odd-numbered side of 59th Avenue, and one block of Inwood Street between Cheverly Avenue & Belleview Avenue.

**NOTE:** The snow emergency parking restrictions do not override existing no-parking zones or apply to streets where enforcement would disallow all parking because of a no-parking zone, or to streets with any barrier or strip dividing lanes of traffic.

**PRIORITIES:** The snow removal operations work under the following priorities: 1.) Cheverly Avenue 2.) principal connecting streets: Forest Road, Crest Avenue, Valleyway, Greenleaf Road, 62nd Avenue, State Street, Schuster Drive; 3.) all other streets.

#### **SAFETY REMINDER:**

We ask residents to remember that your neighbors who walk to Metro, or children walking to school, and the hard working Mail Carriers are exposed to dangerous conditions when sidewalks are not cleared in a timely manner. Failure to comply with Town Code could result in fines.



TOWN CODE Sec. 18-4.1—SIDEWALKS Whenever snow accumulates to a depth of one inch or more, it is the duty of each occupant to clear the snow from the sidewalk adjacent to that property, within 12 hours after the snow ceases, (unless at night, in which case it shall be removed within 12 hours after sunrise). Snow and ice removed from sidewalks shall NOT be deposited on streets or other sidewalks.

When ice forms on sidewalks, occupant shall place sand, ashes or other such material on sidewalks within 6 hours, (unless at night, in which case it can be spread by noon of the next day).

Icy spots on public property can be reported to Public Works at **301-773-2666**.

#### TRASH COLLECTION SCHEDULE

MON Town Wide YARD WASTE (PAPER BAGS or Trash Cans ONLY)

MON East side Regular Garbage Pickup only
TUE West side Regular Garbage Pickup only
WED Town wide RECYCLING (no plastic bags)
THU East side Garbage & SPECIAL TRASH at curb
FRI West side Garbage & SPECIAL TRASH at curb

Residents should place trash at the curb after 7:00PM the day before your pickup. Trash must be placed in cans with tight fitting lids to ward off rodents.

**BAMBOO** is picked up with Thursday/Friday Special Trash. Tied up and bundled no longer than 4'

**ELECTRONICS** are picked up on Wednesday with Recycling. TV's any size, computers (remove hard drive), monitors, keyboards, etc. Place these items next to your recycle bucket.

**APPLIANCES** - Washers, dryers, stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators/freezers (remove doors) microwaves (any size), A/C units (any size) - \$20 for removal, contact Public Works at 301-773-2666

**HOLIDAYS?** Public Works crews DO NOT work on holidays. Collections on holidays are **CANCELLED**
