Message from the Mayor

Marching In!

March is Marching in with a fury. Have you ever had your calendar fill up weeks before you could see the days on the calendar? Our staff has been working hard in supporting Mayor and Council to get things done. By the time you read this, Phase One of the Strategic Planning Process will be complete, we should be close to revealing our town seal, budget discussions regarding the American Rescue Plan funds should have taken place, a developer should be chosen for the Hospital Hill Site, and a Chief of Police should have been selected. We also ensured residents that have waited for decades to get traffic calming measures finally got a vote to have them installed and unanimously passed a Black History Month Resolution for February. We have been busy! All the aforementioned action items require additional follow-up and follow-through with the community, but I want you to know it is clear our team is getting things done. And there is more for March.

In the coming days, our new part-time youth coordinator will reach out to town organizations and set up programming for our teens. The youth coordinator will work closely with VineCorp and the Cheverly Youth Commission. This position will be instrumental in establishing the town's Youth Council that mirrors the Mayor and Council and will provide legislative ideas on behalf of teens. It is so important that the Youth Council is representative of our town so please look out for notifications and get your teen involved!

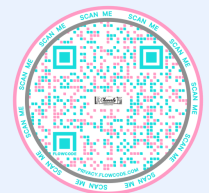

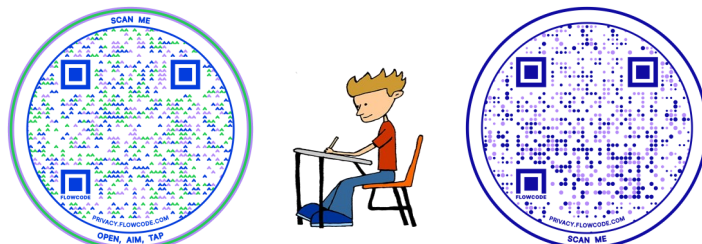

SOLID ANIMAL WASTE ORDINANCE



Sec. 4-10 (a) It shall be unlawful for a person controlling an animal, except a seeing eye dog, to allow or permit solid waste of such animal to remain on the property of any other person without the consent of the owner or occupant thereof; or on such public properties as are prohibited by order of the Mayor and Council of the Town of Cheverly. Prohibited areas are sidewalks, Gast Park, American Legion Park, Boyd Park, & play areas of all other parks.

WINTER WEATHER REMINDERS

TOWN CODE - Sec. 27-10—Parking
A snow emergency shall exist whenever snow has accumulated on the streets to a depth of one (1) inch or more.



WINTER

The provisions of this subsection shall be effective without any notification and shall remain in effect until the street is plowed; provided, however, that when snow shall accumulate to a depth of one inch or more after 11:00PM, the provisions of this subsection shall not be effective until 7:00AM the day following and shall remain in effect until the street is plowed.

PARKING RESTRICTIONS: During a snow emergency no person shall park any vehicle as follows:

- On the cul-de-sac portion of any street,
- On any courts,
- On the even-numbered side of all streets,
- **(exception)** On the odd-numbered side of 59th Avenue, and one block of Inwood Street between Cheverly Avenue & Belleview Avenue.

NOTE: The snow emergency parking restrictions do not override existing no-parking zones or apply to streets where enforcement would disallow all parking because of a no-parking zone, or to streets with any barrier or strip dividing lanes of traffic.

PRIORITIES: The snow removal operations work

under the following priorities: 1.) Cheverly Avenue 2.) principal connecting streets: Forest Road, Crest Avenue, Valley Way, Greenleaf Road, 62nd Avenue, State Street, Schuster Drive; 3.) all other streets.

VACATIONS & HOME SECURITY

Residents planning to be away for vacations should visit <https://www.cheverly-md.gov/cheverly-police-department/webforms/house-check-request> to arrange to have their homes checked while they are gone.

The following items should also be checked to make sure your residence is safe and looks as much as possible like someone is there:

- Cancel newspaper & mail delivery or have a neighbor pick it up for you.
- Arrange for lawn care.
- Store valuables, preferably in a bank.
- Store lawn mowers, bicycles, and lawn furniture inside.
- Set lights inside the house on a timer.
- Set telephone bells as low as possible.
- Draw shades and drapes.
- Lock cars left in the driveway.
- Make sure smoke detectors are working.
- Lock all windows and doors.
- Give your house key & itinerary to at least one friend or neighbor.

SAFETY REMINDER:

We ask residents to remember that your neighbors who walk to Metro, or children walking to school, and the hard working Mail Carriers are exposed to dangerous conditions when sidewalks are not cleared in a timely manner. Failure to comply with Town Code could result in fines.



TOWN CODE Sec. 18-4.1—SIDEWALKS Whenever snow accumulates to a depth of one inch or more, it is the duty of each occupant to clear the snow from the sidewalk adjacent to that property, within 12 hours after the snow ceases, (unless at night, in which case it shall be removed within 12 hours after sunrise). Snow and ice removed from sidewalks shall NOT be deposited on streets or other sidewalks.

When ice forms on sidewalks, occupant shall place sand, ashes or other such material on sidewalks within 6 hours, (unless at night, in which case it can be spread by noon of the next day).

Icy spots on public property can be reported to Public Works at **301-773-2666**.

RESIDENTIAL ZONE PARKING

Residential ZONE parking permits are now available. The price of the permit is \$5 per vehicle with 1 free guest pass per address. A second guest pass may be obtained for \$2. (Only two guest passes per address.)

Applications can be downloaded from the Town website at www.cheverly-md.gov under the Form and File tab.

Please drop completed applications in the Permits Box located at Town Hall or mail to: Code Enforcement, 6401 Forest Road, Cheverly, MD 20785.



Cheverly Residential Zone Parking Permit Application

Due to the Covid19 restrictions, applications for Zone Permits will only be accepted by US Mail or placed in the Permit Box located on the left-side wall of the main entrance at Townhall.

- Permits can only be issued to vehicles registered to a Cheverly Address.
- A copy of your vehicle registration must accompany the Application.
- Cost of the Permit is \$5 per vehicle | 1 Guest Parking Pass is allowed **per residence** at no cost.
- An additional Guest Parking Pass is available for \$2. (No More Than 2 Guest Parking Pass per Address)

If you live in one of the following areas, you will need a Parking Permit: Please check the zone that applies.

- Zone 1: State St, 61st & 62nd Ave, as well as the 1800 Block of 64th Ave
- Zone 2: Eliminated
- Zone 3: 22-2400 Block of Cheverly Ave
- Zone 4: Arbor St & Crestlawn Ave (22-2300 Block Parkway Eliminated)
- Zone 5: 2300 Block of Belleview Ave
- Zone 6: Benton Rd & 23-25 Lake Ake
- Zone 7: 2400 Block of Valley Way
- Zone 8: 3300 Belleview Ave; Medical Ter
- SR: This permit allows senior citizens 65 years of age and older to Park in the Odd Side of the 2200 Block of Cheverly Ave in order to utilize the Metro



Residential Parking Permit are to be Displayed on the Back Left Bumper area.

If you have a regular and a SR permit, display them next to each other on the Back Left Bumper.

Guest Parking Permits shall be hung on the REARVIEW mirror with information facing outward.

Citation may be Issued to ANY Vehicle not in compliance with Town Code 27-5.1 Residential Zone Parking

**TOWN OF CHEVERLY
ORDINANCE No.: 2022-1**

An Ordinance whereby the Mayor and Council of the Town of Cheverly amend Chapter 8-9(f)(3) of the Town Code for the purpose of creating right of special exceptions for corner lot properties.

**TOWN OF CHEVERLY
ORDINANCE No.: 2022-02**

Of the mayor and council of the town of Cheverly amending chapter 24 “streets, sidewalks and other public works projects” of the town code, by repealing and re-enacting § 24-16.1(c) and (d), to require a meeting between residents and the traffic engineer after a petition to install speed humps is validated and requiring the traffic engineer to submit its recommendations to the mayor and council for consideration; and eliminating the requirement that a technical study be performed with each petition to install speed humps.

If delayed due to equipment failures, inclement weather, or other schedule changes, weekly up dates will be provided on the Town's website under News and Announcements.

Please note that the schedule is in reverse order from previous years.

TRASH COLLECTION REMINDER

Sec. 10-7 Except for household trash, which the town may collect from side or rear yards, all collectible trash shall be placed at the street side or curb, but shall not be placed there earlier than 7:00 p.m. on the day before it is scheduled to be collected. All containers or uncollected trash and waste must be removed from the street side or curb by 7:00 p.m. of the day it was scheduled for collection. Upon request of a resident to the town administrator and for good cause shown, the town may collect recyclables from a side or rear yard of the property.



CONTAINERS NOT TO EXCEED THIRTY-TWO (32) GALLON CAPACITY.

Just a reminder, and as stated on the Town's website, **"Containers not to exceed thirty-two (32) gallon capacity."**

Public Works will not pick up nor empty trash containers larger than 32-gallons. This is for the safety of our Public Works employees who manually lift each and every trash can.

**In the interim, until you purchase a 32-gallon trash can with a tight-fitting lid, please remove all trash bags from cans larger than 32-gallons and place them on the curb prior to trash collection.*

BOARD OF ELECTIONS

Cheverly Municipal Election Monday, May 2, 2022 7 am – 8 pm

This year Cheverly will be holding elections for Mayor as well as special elections for Council members from Wards 4 and 5.

Information for Candidates

Candidates for Mayor must be:

- At least 25 years of age on or before election day
- A citizen of the United States
- A registered voter of Cheverly
- A resident of Cheverly for not less than 6 months preceding the election

Candidates for Town Council must be:

- At least 21 years of age on or before election day
- A citizen of the United States
- A registered voter of Cheverly
- A resident of Cheverly for not less than 6 months preceding the election
- A resident of the ward from which they are elected

Forms to file for candidacy may be obtained from the Cheverly website at www.cheverly-md.gov/board-elections or from the Town Hall office during business hours. **Completed forms must be received at Town Hall no later than 5:00 pm on Friday, March 18, 2022.**

Candidate photos and profiles must also be submitted by March 18, 2022 for publication in the April newsletter. Please email the profile and picture to elec-tion@cheverly-md.gov. Contact the Town Clerk at 301-773-8360 if you need further information.

Information for Voters

To be eligible to vote in the Town election, you must **register to vote** in one of two ways:

1. Register to vote with the state of Maryland **before April 2, 2022**. Already registered? Make sure your registration reflects your current Cheverly address. Check here: voterservices.elections.maryland.gov/votersearch
2. Register to vote with the Town of Cheverly. This option is available to any resident who cannot / will not register in Maryland (examples, non-US citizens or active military with active voter registrations in another state) and who meets the eligibility requirements. Registering to vote with the Town may be done at any time, including on election day.

Any registered voter in Cheverly may **request a ballot to be mailed to them** (or to be picked up in-person at Town Hall) if they choose not to vote in person. The request form may be found in this newsletter, picked up in-person at Town Hall, or downloaded from Town website at www.cheverly-md.gov/board-elections. **The deadline to request a mail-in ballot is April 25, 2022.**

Tasks will include assisting with crowd flow, pandemic protocols, and other tasks as assigned by the Board of Election Supervisors. Message from the Chief

As we approach the end of winter, and both pedestrian and vehicular movement increase the need for a comprehensive TRAFFIC SAFETY program form an integral component of effective SAFE COMMUNITY POLICING, within and around our town. While other law enforcement issues constantly compete with traffic safety for CPD attention, such as, THEFT FROM AUTOMOBILES (TFA), which seems to plague our community. As we look at quarterly (TFA) data, we must recognize that, while Cheverly remains below the national, state and county numbers, we within Cheverly must remain: Pro-Active, Vigilant and Informed. The National Rail Corporation (AMTRAK) uses a nationally recognized term titled “See Something, Say Something“ perhaps we can begin discussion about this nationally recognized terminology or develop a unique Cheverly term. Nevertheless, this can be accomplished by way of a unified Public Information and Education Campaign, perhaps led by Cheverly Police Accountability Board (PCAB), Cheverly Youth, civic groups, residents, etc.

Despite the issues we face, I am encouraged by the dedication and resolve of those working to end the (TFA) also known as “crimes of opportunity”. My professional vision for the Cheverly Police Department is a “SAFE COMMUNITY” traffic plan with an age-old strategy to increase: Awareness, strategize with community stakeholders, social media campaign (CPD) visibility throughout our town.

I read an article a few years ago relating to Police Reform and Trust. The article carefully described a policy titled “a duty to intervene “. I do believe this police accountability measure is something to worthy of discussion with the PCAB, Cheverly Police Department sworn members, Town Council and whomever will listen. Simply put, the policy/strategy calls for an officer that engages in physical misconduct, nearby officers will step in and stop it. Key to this policy being, the misconduct is stopped immediately, in view of the community members, if applicable. As a law enforcement professional, I understand and hear the decades long cry for help that people MAY not trust the law enforcement investigative process and recognize they do trust their eyes.

I would like to end this monthly message with three thoughts:

First, the “duty to intervene” notion in no way should be construed to suggest any member of CPD or any other public safety agency has or currently operating unscrupulously or side-ways. Second, I would like to share a quote which, in my opinion, embodies the Cheverly community: “The goal of the Cheverly Police Department, government and residents is to grow so strong on the inside that nothing on the outside can affect the town’s inner wellness, without the town’s conscious permission “ ... just a thought. Third, I look forward to both meeting, strategizing and serving the people that both live, shop, visit and travel thru our community.

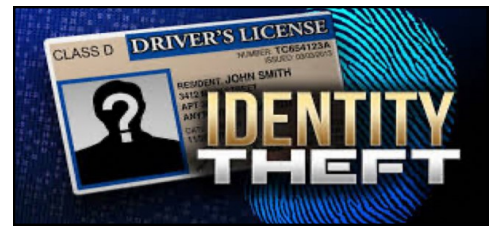

Online Reporting

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the department implemented an online reporting system for some non-emergency calls for service. These calls include auto tampering, destruction of property/property damage, lost property, theft from autos, and certain other thefts that don't rise to the level of burglary. Residents are encouraged to utilize this system, in lieu of the non-emergency number, for incidents that meet the requirements.

You will receive a call from one of our officers to either gather further information or to provide the respective case number. Report Requests

All reports can be requested, via email, at reports@cheverlypolice.org. When submitting your request, please include as much information as possible, that pertains to the report. In addition, a photocopy of the requesting party's ID will need to accompany the request for identification purposes. In response to the state of emergency, all fees associated with report requests have been waived.

Tips@cheverlypolice.org is the email address that residents can use to send non-emergency tips or information to the department. Our investigators are constantly working to investigate criminal

cases in which our residents have been victimized. If you have or believe you have information, photographs, or video that could assist the department, and you don't want to call, please send us an email. If you see someone in immediate danger or a crime being committed, dial 911.

Cheverly's Mass Notification System is Here!

CodeRED allows residents to receive emergency alerts via text, email, or phone call. Upon signing up for the service, users can create a Managed Account, which allows the user to create a username and password and control the following:

1. Types of alerts received:
 - a. Emergency Alerts (Mandatory)
 - b. General Alerts (Optional)
 - c. Weather Alerts (Optional, as provided by the National Weather Service)
2. Method alerts are received:
 - a. Via text message
 - b. Via email
 - c. Via phone call

Users can also perform a Quick signup however, doing so would require the user to call CodeRED's customer service line in order to make any changes to the account.

Users are required to have either a residential or business address, within the Cheverly limits, in order to sign up for an account. The system supports multiple addresses, phone numbers, and emails.

Cheverly's Environment: Annual Report of Volunteer Work, 2021

Cheverly has long prided itself as being a town in which volunteer efforts are welcomed, indeed seen as essential. These efforts have served as a capacity multiplier in a town operating with a lean paid staff. To bring attention to volunteer efforts within Cheverly in the field of the environment and conservation, we present an annual report for the year 2021. Much of the value of these efforts is not quantifiable, but in the spirit of the Town Council's budget season, we have tried to reduce the volunteer work to figures.

The dollar value of volunteer time in Maryland in 2020 was estimated in 2021 by the Do Good Institute at the University of Maryland as \$31.29.

Cheverly Native Plant Program, founded 2021, dedicated to planting native plants on town property. Estimate includes physical and administrative work.

Estimated 1850 hours, value \$ 57,886.50.

Friends of Kilmer Street Park and Arboretum, founded 2021, implements the park plan as adopted by the Town. Estimate includes administrative plus physical work: cleanup, invasive plant removal, and improvement, tree planting and inventory, and public activities.

Estimated 198 hours, value \$ 6,235.02.

Friends of Lower Beaverdam Creek, founded 2007, Woodworth trail creation and maintenance, Estimate primarily physical work: trail maintenance, invasive plant removal, planting, cleanup.

Estimated 330 hours, value \$ 10,325.70.

Green Infrastructure Committee Science Committee, founded 2011. Includes the Plant Rescue Operation, rescuing native plants from development sites and transplanting them to comparable habitats; native plant propagation; wildlife monitoring; nature hikes; Euclid Woods invasive plant control, storm damage mitigation, tree protection, monitoring abuse.

Estimated 490 hours, value \$15,332.10.

Total work hours, 2868; total of calculable volunteer value, **\$89,779.32**

EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM (CERT)

March is Flood Safety Month so here are some Flood Safety Tips

Each year, more deaths occur because of flooding than any other hazard related to thunderstorms. The most common flood deaths occur when a vehicle is driven into hazardous floodwater. Fortunately, you can take steps to protect yourself, your family, and your home.

During a Flood Watch or Warning

- Gather emergency supplies, including food and water. Store at least 1 gallon of water per day for each person and each pet. Store at least a 3-day supply.
- Listen to your local radio or television station for updates.
- Bring in outdoor possessions (lawn furniture, grills, trash cans) or tie them down securely.
- If evacuation appears necessary, turn off all utilities at the main power switch and close the main gas valve.
- Leave areas subject to flooding such as low spots, canyons, washes, etc. (Remember: avoid driving through flooded areas and standing water.)

After Flooding Occurs

- Avoid driving through flooded areas and standing water. As little as six inches of water can cause you to lose control of your vehicle.
- Do not drink flood water, or use it to wash dishes, brush teeth, or wash/prepare food. Drink clean, safe water.
- If you are evacuated, return to your home only after local authorities have said it is safe to do so.
- Listen for boil water advisories. Local authorities will let you know if your water is safe for drinking and bathing.
 - During a water advisory, use only bottled, boiled, or treated water for drinking, cooking, etc.
- When in doubt, throw it out! Throw away any food and bottled water that comes/may have come into contact with floodwater.

CHEVERLY NATIVE PLANTING PROJECT

February 28th-March 4th is National Invasive Species Awareness Week. Invasive plants are non-native and able to proliferate so quickly that they degrade natural habitats and water quality, threaten the survival of native plants and animals, and damage ecosystem functions like soil retention and flooding control. After habitat destruction, invasive species are the second greatest threat to biodiversity.

We can see many of the problems linked to invasive plants in our own yards. Many of our trees are at great risk of falling or dying because of being heavily weighted by invasive vines. Beneficial native shrubs and plants are crowded out or smothered. And, some invasives are linked to increased populations of mosquitos and ticks.

Unfortunately, for our natural areas and parks, our yards are where their problems start. It is estimated that over 80-percent invasive shrubs, trees, and vines are escapees from yards and landscaped projects. Even if the invasives on our properties may not seem like they are a problem, they may be causing damage elsewhere.

While there are too many to list here, ten of the common invasive plant species in Cheverly include:

1. English ivy - *Hedera helix*
2. Japanese and Chinese wisteria - *Wisteria*

3. floribunda and *Wisteria sinensis*
4. Amur honeysuckle - *Lonicera maackii*
5. Barberry - *Berberis thunbergia*
6. Bamboo - *Phyllostachys aurea* and *Phyllostachys aureosulcata*
7. Callery or Bradford pear- *Pyrus calleryana*
8. Burning bush or Winged euonymus - *Euonymus alatus*
9. Wintercreeper - *Euonymus fortunei*
10. Yellow flag iris - *Iris pseudacorus*
11. Nandina or Heavenly bamboo - *Nandina domestica*

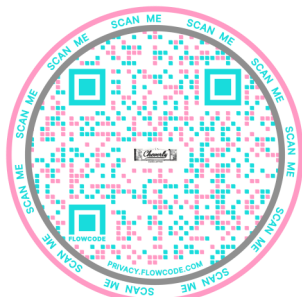
