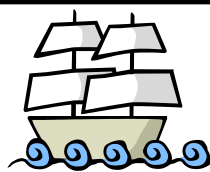

Cheverly Signs MOU for New Motel near Wyndham Gardens: The town recently signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with a developer who plans to build a new hotel on the property where the

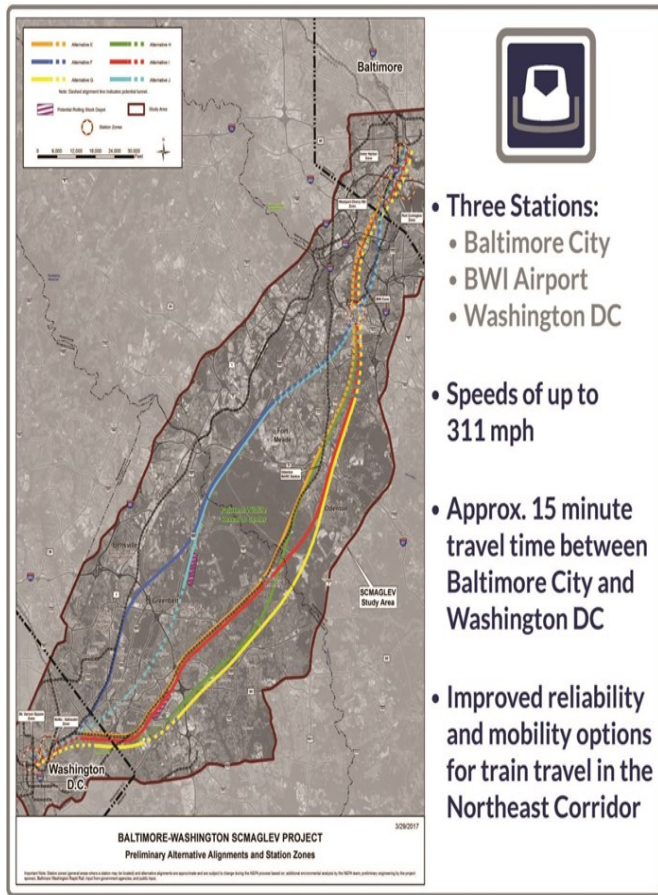
Pointe @ Cheverly was planned to be built.

The Town held initial conversations with the developer and has insisted that the hotel be of a certain quality and meet standards of our community.

A hotel is a great addition to our community. Did you know that the Wyndham Hotel provides not only property tax, but also over \$70,000 in rental taxes annually? So a new hotel in Cheverly will add significantly to our tax base at a location where we are currently generating no taxes.

There is still a way to go, 5/6th's of the property is owned by the county Redevelopment Authority (RDA). Over the next couple of months the RDA, Cheverly and the developer will work on an agreement that will allow the developer to purchase the property to build a hotel.

A New Look for Cheverly Row? Well first of what exactly is Cheverly Row? Cheverly Row is the shopping center directly across from the Walgreens. As mentioned previously in the Newsletter a new owner took control of the property 2 years ago. That owner is now ready to move forward with a facelift and a potential pad site in the parking lot.

The Town Council plans to hear from the owner in the September 28th Work Session, and looks forward to seeing the plans. While this is all very good news, please don't expect to see a turnover in the businesses at the shopping center. Businesses in these centers tend to sign very long leases, and even a turnover of ownership does not alter the lease terms.

Let's Talk Maglev: Earlier this year the town hosted a presentation sponsored by Maryland Department of Transportation (MDOT) regarding the proposed Magnetic Levitating Train (Maglev) and its potential routes. The high-speed, superconducting magnetic levitation (SCMAGLEV) system is proposed by a pri-

vate company, Baltimore Washington Rapid Rail (BWRR). The SCMAGLEV system would operate between Washington, DC, and Baltimore, Maryland, with only one stop at BWI Marshall Airport. Given the Washington to Baltimore route Cheverly was inevitably near the all of the paths. Most of the potential routes travel along Amtrak / CSX tracks by the Metro Station, however some routes utilize the BW Parkway.

In October MDOT is hosting five meetings to solicit comments from citizens in affected communities. At these meetings you will be able to discuss the project with study team members and provide comments. If you cannot attend one of the meetings, you are encouraged to submit comments at any time through the website, www.bwmaglev.info, which will be updated to include all of the meeting materials.

Some Thoughts about the Future Route of Maglev:

At one time I believed that this was a lot to do about nothing. I figured the expense of building and the potential land acquisition and environmental studies would weigh down the effort, especially given the incredibly small benefit of getting from Washington to Baltimore in 15 minutes.

However, recent events add momentum to the possibility of this moving forward. Most of the original work seemed to focus on a route that would use the Amtrak/CSX “right of way” but would create the need to purchase private lands in Bowie, Severn Park and elsewhere. This seemed like significant hurdle with a tremendous public outcry.

However, two events occurred during the 3rd week of September:

- 1) On September 21st Governor Hogan announced his desire to develop a Public Private Partnership that would expand Routes 495, 270 and 295 (from Washington to Baltimore) and to pay for the project with Toll Lanes. A key component of Governor Hogan’s program is for Maryland to work with the Department of Interior to transfer control of the Baltimore Washington Parkway from the Department of the Interior (National Park Service) to the State of Maryland.
- 2) Governor Hogan sent a letter to stating emphatically that he would only support a Maglev route that could be built in existing “rights of way”. Many of the proposed routes have portions that require the purchase of private land.

For years the National Park Service has fought any type of change along the Parkway, if the transfer of control occurs then I’d (this is my personal opinion) bet a fair sum of money that the Parkway will become the preferred route for the Maglev Train as it will provide a complete “right of way” directly to the Baltimore Washington International and that “right of way” would already be under construction for the purpose of expanding lanes on the Parkway.

The Town Council will continue to monitor this situation, but we will need your help. Please attend a Maglev meeting and give us your thoughts.

Governor Hogan Announces Highway Expansion:

As noted above, Governor Hogan announced plans to expand Route 450, 270 and the Baltimore Washington Parkway to add extra lanes. Governor Hogan plans to enter a Public Private Partnership where private developers will pay for the highway expansion and will recoup their costs by placing tolls on the expanded lanes.

Obviously expanding the Baltimore Washington Parkway will have a significant impact on Cheverly. To accomplish this the Department of Interior (National Park Service) has to agree to transfer ownership of the Parkway to the State of Maryland before anything can happen. However, given the existing political climate and the fact that the Interior Department has already recommended reducing the size of some National Monuments the transfer of the Parkway is a very real possibility.

If the Parkway is transferred to Maryland it is very likely that the Parkway will become the primary option for the Maglev train. This of course adds another layer of concern. I have already heard from many residents and the opinions vary greatly. Many residents feel that the gridlock on the Parkway is untenable and something has to be done and others simply feel that the Parkway should remain as is.

While this whole process is in its infancy, please know the Town Council will be watching closely.

Is Something Happening at the Craftsman Building? It is so important that we not get out in front of our headlights, but yes something is happening. Again, the Craftsman Building is a 185,000 SF building in the Cheverly Industrial Park that borders directly to the Cheverly Pool.

The new owners of this property are working to make this building a venue for food, entertainment, classes, maker spaces and community building.

An effort like this requires many things, zoning changes, investment, and patience. It’s easy to talk about the end product, but it is critical that we understand that the venue will grow organically depending on what “uses” are first adapters and what is allowable via zoning.

The Town will work closely with the owners and the county to adapt zoning laws, but remember that it is the county that passes zoning laws not the Town. Good news on this front is that the County is already considering laws to allow food store and liquor sales in I-1 zoned areas. They are also looking to allow performance studios in I-1. These are positive changes for the owners of Craftsman.

Attendees of the “Sip Locally” event met with the Mid Pointe Brewery who is very excited about opening a Brew Pub at the site. The owners of the building are also working to attempt to draw food trucks to store their vehicles here. There are many other “irons in the fire” but as of this time it is still a work in progress.

6301 Kilmer Update: Mike, What the heck is happening here? I have to admit this is a very fair question. Our current goal is to simply make the property safe and remove the fence so that folks can enjoy the Green Space. This required us to cover an existing well, fill the fish pond with pea gravel to appropriate depth, run electricity to the garage and ensure the garage is buttoned up, remove the home and do some grading to ensure proper footing.

Each of these tasks are being performed by our Public Works Department in an effort to reduce costs. Unfortunately, squeezing these tasks into the very busy Public Works Schedule has been a difficult. We are in the last stages, and all of the big items have been accomplished. We await the completion of electrical work, and some limited ground repair. We look forward it being available soon.

Many residents continue to believe that this will be the site of a Dog Park. This is NOT the case. Due to the proximity to residences and the school property this was not an appropriate location. Many residents also ask about synergies with the school system. The Town will continue to talk to the school system about potential uses, however at this time there is no action on this front.

This is the Time of Year to Plant a Free Tree:

Folks, please consider planting a canopy tree in your yard. Our Public Works Department will order your tree, and plant it in your yard all you need to do is add love.

Call Public Works at (301) 773-2666 and get a tree this fall.

The Town will continue to plant street trees in the tree boxes throughout town in an effort to replenish our tree canopy. However, street trees face many problems such as lack of hydration, concrete barriers and lack of space to grow. Trees planted in front yards are much more likely to succeed.

Some residents have complained about the town planting trees in the tree boxes in front of their home. Please remember, these tree boxes (approximately 8 to 11 feet from the curb) are part of the right of way and the town can plant in these areas. We have worked with some residents and not planted in the tree box if that resident agrees to plant a tree in their yard instead.

A Trust Act for Cheverly: The Council will continue conversations regarding the Trust Act, in their September work session. No discussions occurred in August because our town attorney was unavailable to attend.

Many residents have asked “Will this change how the police department operates?” As I understand, at this time this will not change how our force operates. Today, our Police Department does not require documentation from anyone.

Other residents have asked “what happens to a felon who maybe undocumented?” Again, the Cheverly Police Department does not get involved in documentation. However, please know that Cheverly like all surrounding municipalities does not have jail or holding facilities. So when someone is arrested and detained in a county facility that documentation status is very much considered. At this point, a municipality has no control over the process.

I have come to think of this as a front end process (our police departments) and a back end process (jails and holding facilities). Most Police Departments I have spoken with (whether they have declared Sanctuary Status or not) do not require documentation from individuals at traffic stops, who call for assistance, or in any activity. However, when an individual is detained and is placed in jail facility documentation is considered.

The council has briefly discussed two options for moving forward on this matter either passing an ordinance or a resolution. An ordinance would have the effect of law, and while it simply would state the practice as it already is, many feel that this is needed. Another option is for the Council to pass a resolution without an ordinance. A resolution would voice the intent of the council.

In the August newsletter I published a Question and Answer with Chief Robshaw regarding Cheverly's existing policy. Rather than reprint, I suggest you check it out on-line at http://www.cheverly-md.gov/Pages/CheverlyMD_Newsletters/08newsletter2017.pdf.

The gist of the Q&A is that the Cheverly Police does not consider an individual's documentation in the course of their activities. To be clear, *if an undocumented individual needs help of any type from the Cheverly Police they should reach out to the police without any fear of reprisal.*

Feral Cats in our Community: Recently, the Town Council has received an increasing level of complaints about feral cats creating a nuisance in our community. The Council began discussions on this topic in their July meeting and invited Rodney Taylor from County Animal Control to the August work session to discuss. I would like to emphasize that Cheverly has many responsible feral cat caretakers in our community, however there are apparently some who are not.

The following is a short description of the meeting. I would like to thank Councilwoman MacKenzie who is working with residents to define the problem and possible solutions.

Feral Cats are not considered domestic animals, however feral cats are subject to Trap, Neuter and Release (TNR) laws in Prince George's County. Therefore, any feral cat with a snipped ear (neutered) is allowed to be at large in our community.

Cats with un-snipped ears (un-neutered) are not allowed to be at large and are only allowed on leash or on the owner's property. If a cat with un-snipped ears is feral and is creating a nuisance the cat can be trapped with humane traps provided by the town or

county and then returned to the county animal control. The goal of this activity would be to get the cat neutered or returned to the owner.

The Town Council will be considering policies over the next few months to determine how to best reduce the population of feral cats who have not been neutered. Obviously one way to make this happen is to ensure these cats are neutered. We will be exploring opportunities for partnering with organizations that provide these services as well as investigating technologies that prevent feral cats from entering property where they are not wanted.

Climate Change Resolution: As a Maryland Municipality that has attained the status of a Sustainable Community, the council has displayed a desire to sign on to the organization's proclamation regarding Climate Change. The Town has shown consistent progress to meet the goals of Sustainable Maryland and to reduce the energy consumption and carbon footprint of the town. In effect the Town Council believes Science is Science!

This was introduced in the September Town Meeting, and read three times prior to passage. You can find the current version of the resolution on the Town Website.

Curbside Composting: Cheverly has a very backyard composting program, and everyone is encouraged to purchase a composter from Public Works for a reduced price. Peg and I have been composting for six years and we are shocked by the reduction in the trash we bring to the curb. And yes, there are no negative impacts such as odors or animals.

However, not everyone wants to compost in their backyard, due to space and other concerns. For these people, our resident composting expert Doug Alexander is attempting to get a curb side composting program going. The program would be simple, for a small one-time fee the town would provide you a counter top container and a 10 gallon receptacle to place your compostable waste in. Once a week you would take it to the curb and public works will pick it

To start the program we need at least 100 residents to join to make it cost effective and efficient for our Public Works staff. If you are interested please call Public Works at 301-773-2666.

Friday Night Trash? Please No! A long standing Cheverly Policy is that trash and yard waste should not be placed on the curb over the weekend, so that our neighborhood looks great. However, on occasion a resident will put trash or yard waste out on Friday after trash pick-up and it sits all weekend.

Public Works picks up this trash late Friday afternoon, but charges a \$25 fee for the service. Please don't leave your trash or yard waste on the curb on Fridays as no one wants to look at it all weekend.

THEFT FROM AUTOMOBILES – While crime has continued to decrease over the last several years, we have continued to experience theft from automobiles. Remember to lock vehicles and park in well-lit areas when possible. In addition, if you see someone looking into vehicles, or pulling vehicle door handles, be sure to call our Tip-Line at 301-789-5090.

TEXTING AND HAND HELD TELEPHONE USE WHILE DRIVING – It has been illegal to text or operate a hand held cellular telephone while operating your vehicle on the traveled portion of the road (including waiting at traffic lights or stop signs) since 2012. Texting and/or holding a telephone or other communications device is a primary offense, which means that these violations are enforceable by the police regardless of whether there is another violation or not. Despite repeated warnings about texting or using hand held communication devices, the CPD write summons for these violations every day. Current research indicates that texting or talking on a cell telephone causes the same distracted driving that is also associated with driving while intoxicated or driving under the influence.

RESIDENTS DO MAKE THE DIFFERENCE – For years now I have been touting the importance of community partnerships between residents and their police and how this association goes a long way towards making Cheverly safer! You must remember L.E.W.D. (Lock Every Window and Door), C-PACT (Cheverly – Police and Citizens Together), and any of the other successful partnership ventures, were put in place to ultimately reduce or deter crime. What makes these associations so special, however, are the individual residents who participate.

WE NEED YOUR VEHICLE DONATIONS – I want to thank all of you who responded to my recent requests for vehicles. As always, all donated cars and trucks are towed for free and those that are not in good condition are scrapped and the scrap money added to the Department's equipment account. The Department is still looking to convert some of our donated vehicles to surveillance uses. Please keep us in mind if you want to donate a used

vehicle or if you just wanted to get rid of a vehicle that is passed its prime.

Explore the Wilderness Next Door -- Boyd Park, Cabin Branch, Lower Beaverdam Creek

Cheverly has five natural areas awaiting your discoveries. Leave the car in the driveway – you can get there by bike or on foot.

The largest of Cheverly's natural areas, the Boyd Park-Cabin Branch Hub, includes the flood-plains of Lower Beaverdam Creek and Cabin Branch, and Boyd Park. The floodplains preserve the largest patches of wild-flowers in Cheverly, perhaps only because they are mostly inaccessible for much of the year. The creeks support species found only around water, such as ducks, herons and kingfishers, beavers, and even the occasional otter. Boyd Park contains a small patch of hardwoods, a hard surface ADA accessible fitness path, a playing field and picnic area, and the Cheverly Community Gardens. The floodplain is already under federal protection, but its vegetation is severely threatened by invasive species.

A combination of paved and natural-surface trails and roads allows you to explore Cabin Branch. Boyd Park is owned by the Town of Cheverly; most of the remainder of the route is M-NCPPC land.

From the parking lot at Boyd Park, on 64th Avenue, walk toward a wooden fence, then turn right on a U-shaped paved walking/fitness trail. Beyond the fence you will be able to spot Cabin Branch downhill on your left. Continue along the trail as it leaves the stream, passing pawpaws and mature hickory trees, as well as May Apples and Jack-in-the-Pulpit in spring. The trail will bring you back to the parking lot.

Walk north along 64th Avenue to the bridge crossing Cabin Branch. Turn west onto a natural-surface desire path just south of the stream and follow it to Trent Street. Follow Trent Street and continue nearly straight, entering a woods road. The road ends at a Pepco right-of-way; you will see the row of power line poles. Turn right and continue to Lower Beaverdam Creek. Look upstream to your right; you will see where Cabin Branch enters Lower Beaverdam Creek.

Cheverly Village – what's it worth?

How affordable is it? The Village is committed to being affordable for everyone in Cheverly. Membership fees are set according to a sliding scale reflecting household income. For example, someone living alone with an annual income up to \$30,000 would pay only \$90 for a year's membership; while the same person with income above \$50,000 would pay \$450 per year.

What are its benefits? Member benefits include rides to doctors or stores, help with small tasks around the house and yard, assistance with a computer or cell phone, helpful information about government programs and neighbor-recommended businesses, home visits and respite support for caregivers, as well as social activities and presentations. Members have the assurance that one phone call will bring help or advice from a friendly, understanding service coordinator.

How do its benefits compare with commercial services? Some examples: the minimum for a round trip by Uber to Washington Hospital Center, Bowie, or Bethesda would run \$30, \$42 or \$72, respectively; and a longer trip such as Annapolis or Gaithersburg would cost \$80 or \$110. For a minor repair or help organizing a closet, handymen or "taskers" in our area advertise hourly rates of \$60 or more with a two-hour minimum. There is no fee for Cheverly Village services.

Why does the Village charge anything? After all, we are a 501(c)(3) nonprofit and services are provided by unpaid volunteers. Member fees and donations cover: liability insurance to protect members and volunteers; training for volunteers; membership in related groups that help us improve member services; outreach costs, such as for the website and space use; and, soon, some office services and part-time staff.

What about the intangibles? While Uber or Lyft will drive you to an address, the Village provides a caring companion who will see to it that you find your doctor's office, will bring you home immediately afterward and provide companionship along the way. Although a commercial service can deliver meals while you're home recovering from surgery, a Village volunteer will provide a friendly visit along with your meal. No dollar value can capture the fun and fellowship of Game Night Potlucks and other Village social activities.

All together, Cheverly Village members receive the companionship and support to remain in our homes as valued, active members of the community as we face the uncertainties of aging. That is priceless.

Leaf Collection or Leaf Mulching



Every season has its beauty and specific tasks that must be performed by your department of public works. During the warm summer days, plans were made for the fall to plant trees, fix some of the flower beds, repair some sidewalks and prepare the equipment for the year's leaf vacuuming collection efforts. Somewhere in this newsletter you will find the leaf collection schedule. This is the time when the Town's crews will be in your area so that you can be ready to rake your leaves to the curb.



The leaf collection schedule is by no means perfect. Despite the yearly adjustments; the leaf collection crews cannot be at all places at the same time or when the leaves decide to fall. Some years the best scheduled plan for collection is too early, others times a little late; the leaves have yet to share their falling schedule with anyone. Nevertheless, if raked to the curb, bagged and/or containerized they will be collected. Now as you know and value, the Town of Cheverly can arguably be construed as unique within Prince Georges County. It is an eyesore to have the Town littered with bagged leaf at the curb prior to the scheduled Monday collection. Although it can be considered a violation of the Town's code this practice makes the Town look shabby over the weekend when the town has prospective buyers and visitors. Please keep the bagged leaves on your property until Sunday night.

On the other hand this might be the year that you can help with nature's perfect cycle. How about letting the trees and your lawn clippings come together to "self-fertilize?" Why not take your mower or ask the service that mows your lawn to run the mower over your leaves from north to south and from east to west? The mixture of nitrogen rich grass particles mixed with the carbon rich leaves that have fallen on your lawn make the best combination for you lawn and for the environment.



But you don't have to take just my words on this matter; read this excerpt: *"Raking and collecting leaves every autumn is a tradition without scientific basis."*



"Based upon research at several uni-versities, the organic matter and nutrients from leaves mown into lawn areas has been proven to improve turf quality. At Michigan State, researchers set a rotary mower to cut at a height of 3 inches and then mowed an 18-inch-deep layer of leaves into test plots. That's the equivalent of 450 pounds of leaves per 1,000 square feet. The tests resulted in improved soil and healthy lawns with few remnant leaves visible the following spring." <http://www.finegardening.com/improve-your-soil-raking-less> by Terry Ettinger.

The Department of Public Works will be picking up falls raked leaves just like last year. Once again residents will be provided with three ways to remove the leaves from the lawn: 1- bagged them in paper bags and leave by the curb for Monday's yard waste collection; 2- place them in a container for Monday's yard waste collection; 3- when your block is schedule for collection - rake them to the tree planting strip without blocking the sidewalk or allowing them to fall on the curbs and blocking the nearby storm drain.



On the other hand: How about Nature's cycle and mulching them? This could be year that we as a Town permit the cycle to continue and thereby doing our part in the restoration and the nurturing of our piece of the earth.
