Town Council Will Consider Replacements for Ward 2 Councilmember: The Town Council will select a replacement for the vacancy for the Ward 2 council seat in the January 24th council meeting. The council will follow the procedures that have been used previously when other openings have occurred. The council will review submitted documents, listen to a 3 to 5 minute speech from the applicants and then vote for the replacement. The selected candidate must

Any resident of Ward 2 is encouraged to participate in this process. Residents of Ward 2 who are interested in filling the vacancy should submit a letter of interest outlining the reasons they are interested in joining council, a resume and fill out a financial disclosure form. (The Financial Disclosure form is required by state ethics rules, and will be kept on file in the office. According to state ethics rules these documents can be accessed by anyone upon request.)

These documents should be submitted at Town Hall prior to close of business on January 16th so that councilmembers can review prior to the January 24th council meeting.

Qualification to be a councilmember:

- must be 21 years old on or before the date of election;
- a citizen of the United States;
- a registered voter; and
- a resident of Cheverly for not less than six months
- a resident of the Ward for which they are running, prior either to the date of filing, or 45 days immediately preceding the date of the Election in the case of a write-in candidate.

Given that town wide elections will be held for the Mayor and all Councilmembers on the first Monday in May, the selected candidate will serve for only 3.5 months.

Cheverly Boom Update: The Town has continued communication with the Smith & Sons Company regarding the recent Booms that occurred and steps that they are taking to prevent them. They are once again following their agreed upon hours of operation for the shredding machine which is the source of much ambient noise throughout town as well as the booms. The hours of operation are 7:00AM to 7:00PM.

Mayor's FYI Continued...

Air Quality Monitoring Update: As discussed in previous newsletters the town has pursued a proposal with the University of Maryland to implement air quality monitors around the periphery of the town. This initiative was the outcome of a meeting between the community, the Maryland Department of Environment (MDE) and the Smith & Sons Company regarding the implementation of new equipment at the Smith site. While Smith and Sons stated that the new equipment will actually reduce particulate matter, the Cheverly residents advocated for better air quality measurement data from MDE.

MDE was unable to provide the type of data required so the Town agreed to identify if there were other ways to acquire the data. Fortunately, Dr Wilson from the University of Maryland has worked with other communities to provision and monitor air quality data and has provided a proposal for the town and the surrounding communities.

The Town Council will review the proposal, which should cost less than \$25,000, in the January worksession to determine whether to move forward.

WSSC Planning to Reline Sewer Line in 2019: The Town Council will hear from the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission in the January 10th Town Council meeting to better understand WSSC's plan for relining the sewer lines throughout town. WSSC will discuss the specifics of the project, its purpose and how it works, as well as the levels of disruption we can expect while they are working.

At this time, I can not provide specific details, but all are welcome to attend the meeting and hear for themselves.

As we ring in the New Year, we do so with crime down approximately 18% overall, from 2017. Specifically, burglaries are down

27.5%, auto thefts are down 62.5%, and thefts are down 21.5%. While all of this is good news, we unfortunately saw a rise in robberies from 9 to 12. Please be vigilant when walking at night. Try not to look at your phone, be aware of your surroundings, and avoid dark areas when possible. The Town Council is working hard to address lighting issues throughout the town and I have voiced my opinion to increase lighting in the area of the metro, and the Cheverly Avenue, Columbia Park Road, and Arbor Street intersections.

One concerning issue that has been brought to my attention is that vehicles are not always stopping for school buses. Please be sure to stop for school buses and remember that where there is a stopped school bus, there are children. Officers have been provided with bus route schedules and will be issuing a \$570.00 citation to any violator.

Thank you to everyone who was able to contribute to our Shop with a Cop program. It was a huge success and 17 children got to experience the event this year. This year, all 17 children were picked up by an officer and taken to Target in Bowie, where they were able to go on a \$150.00 shopping spree with an officer. The children then got to operate the lights, sirens, and loud speaker during the caravan back to the police station, where they met Santa Claus and had lunch with their officer.

P.S. I apologize for the sirens and causing any concern. Next year we will be sure to publicize the event and ensure that residents are warned beforehand.

Over the last few months, the Cheverly Police Department has been working diligently to connect with our community and improve the service we provide, as well as the relationship we have with our community. 

Happy New Year.....it is not too soon to be thinking about your garden and yard. First...be careful when snow falls on your plants...hard knocking will break those branches hence the blooms for spring will be gone....Some may have to be covered...especially the Camellias that bloom early. GREEN @ HOME -- No, No Nandina!

This winter many of us may be planning our gardens for the spring, so let's talk about one plant that should not be in your garden.

Nandina domestica, commonly known as nandina, heavenly bamboo or sacred bamboo, is a species of flowering shrub from Asia. It is not really a bamboo. It is evergreen, has bright red berries, and is used widely as an ornamental. It grows well in our planting zone, is shade-tolerant and deer-resistant.

So what's not to like?

Nandina is invasive, and escapes into forests from old plantings where it displaces native vegetation. Nandina is included on the Maryland Department of Natural Resources' Do Not Plant List.

The Maryland Department of Agriculture has done a Weed Risk Assessment on Nandina and considers it a High Risk as an invasive plant.

Nandina leaves and berries are toxic to livestock, birds, and other animals.

Nandina is not permitted to be sold in Maryland without written warnings.

What can we plant instead?

Winterberry holly (*Ilex verticilata*) is an evergreen shrub native to our area, provides berries that last all winter that are good food for birds, and is a host for pollinator species. You will need both male and female plants to get berries.

Remember, it is best to look for the true native plants rather than cultivars.

Leaf Brigade! Snow Patrol!

Raking leaves or shoveling snow can feel like chores, but in Cheverly these tasks engender community too. All across town, neighbors greet each other as we bag leaves or rake them for the vacuum truck to collect, and we help each other

dig out after it snows.

Cheverly Village's Leaf Brigade and our Snow Patrol aim to extend these "very Cheverly" community traditions more systematically to seniors who need the help. Last fall, Cheverly Village members who needed help with leaves signed up to have volunteers rake their leaves one time—if possible, timing the raking to the Town's leaf vacuum schedule. Almost 15 members of the Village's Leaf Brigade, supplemented by Junior Girl Scout Troop 2071, have been clearing the leaves from their assigned Village members' yards.

Similarly, Village members who believed they would need help clearing snow from their entryways and front sidewalk have signed up to be paired with a Village volunteer who lives nearby—one of the approximately 15 members of the Snow Patrol. Once it snows, the assigned volunteer clears the snow, making it safer for the member to walk between their door and the sidewalk or their car.

Al Dwyer, who manages the Village's Leaf Brigade and the Snow Patrol, says, "Additional volunteers are always welcome!" Al explains, "It's not necessary to undergo the training we require for those Village volunteers who work directly with our members. Just call 240 770 1033 to tell the Coordinator you'd like to help." He adds, "The attitude of the volunteers has been wonderful!"

To express our appreciation for the Leaf Brigade and Snow Patrol members—both the long-standing Village volunteers and the community volunteers that join them at this time of year to rake or shovel—the Village's Volunteer Support Team is organizing evening celebrations around a fire pit in Legion Park. The Leaf Brigade will be celebrated in mid-January, and the Snow Patrol members will be recognized in March, dates to be confirmed. Passers-by who see the Cheverly Village banner are encouraged to join in thanking the volunteers.

- You must have Vehicle Registration (registered to Cheverly address) to register your vehicle
- Parking Permits cost \$5 / 1 Guest Parking Permit allowed per residence at no cost.
- \$2 for an additional Guest Parking Permit (maximum of 2 guest permits per residence)

If you live in one of the following zones, you will need a parking permit:

Zone 1: State Street, 61st & 62nd Avenues, as well as the 1800 Block of 64th Avenue.

Zone 2: ELIMINATED

Zone 3: 22-2400 blocks of Cheverly Avenue

Zone 4: Arbor, Crestlawn, [22-2300 blks Parkway] (ELIMINATED)

Zone 5: 2300 block of Belleview

Zone 6: Benton Road; 23-2500 Blocks of Lake

Zone 7: 2400 block of Valley Way

Zone 8: 3300 Belleview; Medical Terrace [Lockwood Road, 5600blk Jason, 32-3300blk Tremont] (ELIMINATED)

SR: The odd side of the 2200 Block of Cheverly Avenue

[This permit allows senior citizens 65 years of age or older to park their car in this area in order to utilize Metro].

Residential Parking Permits are displayed on the BACK LEFT bumper area.

If you have a regular zone permit and a SR permit display them next to each other on the back left bumper.

Guest Parking Permits shall be hung on Rear View mirror with information facing outward.

Citations may be issued to any vehicle not in compliance with Town Code 27-5.1: "Residential Zone Parking" If you should have any questions, please contact the Photo Enforcement Unit at 240-770-7641.
