

LOW CRIME TOTALS DO NOT EQUATE TO LOW POLICE ACTION: At the end of this report, you will notice that there were only five (5) reported crimes in the Town for the month of February. This is a tremendously low total, due for the most part, because of the strong partnership that the Cheverly Police Department has with the residents of Cheverly. Both parties have to contribute evenly to attain a low crime rate, and Cheverly residents have

always be very diligent and active in reporting suspicious persons, vehicles, and circumstances that have a strong foundational link to reported crime.

What doesn't show up in crime statistics, and what is not apparent in these numbers, is the amount of time and effort that the Police Department expends working to deter crime on a daily basis. For example, for the month of February, the CPD handled 91 incidents that are not usually reported in the newsletter and wrote 89 reports. These incidents range from warrant services, to impounds, to multiple arrests for illegal drug violations, to field observation reports. and DUI violations. In addition, over 110 calls for service that do not result in a written report were handled by CPD officers in February. These calls range from domestic arguments, to suspicious circumstances, to neighbor complaints, to traffic complaints and accidents that do not require police investigation. None of the totals also include the 115 house and area checks that CPD officers handle monthly.

In addition to calls for service and deterrence actions, CPD officers made 29 adult arrests in February along with 1 juvenile arrest. These included 12 arrests for illegal drugs and 2 handgun violations. In addition to full custody arrests, CPD officers issued 9 criminal citations and served 11 criminal warrants. Regarding traffic enforcement, CPD officers wrote a combined 559 citations, warnings, and repair orders, and arrested 4 persons for DWI.

Maintaining a low crime really is a full time job that requires dedicated Town employees and observant residents. Both have to work in tandem to produce dramatic results. This article was designed to show some of the results of these efforts, but to also highlight the tremendous amount of work that makes it possible to report such a low monthly crime rate.

VEHICLE DONATIONS: Your vehicle donations are critical to the ability of the Police Department to maintain

its high level of equipment and its access to superior training for the coming year. The advantage of donating your vehicle to the Town, aside from the tax benefit, is that you actually can see your donation dollars at work.

CRIME MAPS: The Cheverly Police Department now produces monthly and yearly crime maps showing the distribution and current quantity of crime around the Town. These maps are, by design, overlarge to allow for the visualization of symbols indicating individual and types of crime. Unfortunately, this larger size makes it difficult to adapt to the Newsletter structure. Anyone wishing one of these maps can get one for free at the Police Station.

Mosquitoes are Coming,

Mosquitoes are Coming

The spring season brings a host of beauty to our area becoming a feast to our eyes and ears. Spring also brings rain and with rain, wet weather which can become stagnant water, the breeding ground/ facilitator for mosquitoes.

In the event that you wish to host mosquitoes within the immediate area of you property and share them with the community, please let stagnant water remain on your property... That pretty much sums it up. Stagnant/standing/ puddles of water become the host where mosquitoes will lay their eggs. Within five days the immediate area will be hearing the mosquitoes buzzing sound as they search for a blood meal and perhaps leave the host with a medical need

On the other hand you may not wish to host mosquitoes on your property or share them with the community. If this is you, please consider incorporating the guidelines below from the <u>Maryland Depart-</u><u>ment of Agriculture...</u>

Tips to Rid Your Community of Mosquito Breeding Sites

- Clean rain gutters to allow water to flow freely.
- Remove old tires or drill drainage holes in tires used for playground equipment.
- Store plastic wading pools inside or turn them upside down when not in use.
- Turn over or remove clay pots and plastic containers.
- Dispose of all empty beverage containers, plastic wrappers, discarded toys, etc.
- Check for trapped water in plastic or canvas tarps used to cover boats, pools, etc. Arrange the tarp to drain the water.
- Pump out bilges in boats. Turn canoes and small boats upside down for storage.
- Replace water in bird baths at least twice a week.

MOSQUITOES cont'd

- Flush livestock water troughs twice a week.
- Don't leave garbage can lids lying upside down. Be sure water does not collect in the bottom of garbage cans.
- Flush water in the bottom of plant holders twice a week.
- Fix dripping outside water faucets.
- Turn wheelbarrows upside down when stored outside.
- Check around construction sites or do-it-yourself improvements to ensure that proper backfilling and grading prevent drainage problems.
- Check ornamental ponds, tree holes and water-holding low areas for mosquito larvae.
- Call the nearest Mosquito Control Office (see below) if you find, or suspect, mosquito larvae are present.

If ditches do not flow and contain stagnant water for one week or longer, they can produce large numbers of mosquitoes. Report such conditions to a Mosquito Control Office. Do not attempt to clear these ditches because they may be protected by wetland regulations.

On Tuesday nights mosquito control products will be sprayed in the areas where residents have made phone calls to public works and/or the Agriculture Department. These calls result in monitoring and identified areas as having an increase in the mosquito population. Please monitor the sources of stagnant water on your property and, if possible, ask your neighbors to do the same. Working together early in spring the mosquitoes breeding sites can be minimized... Please call the Department of Public Works. Report your mosquito situation between 7:30 AM and 4:00 PM, Monday through Friday, except federal holidays to 301-773-2666.

This year our priority issues are: 1) Adopt the Maryland Law Enforcement and Governmental Trust Act; 2) Protect the Affordable Care Act and Medicaid in Maryland; 3) Ban fracking in Maryland; 4) Oppose the bill to prevent local jurisdictions from establishing a minimum wage above the state level; 5) Adopt mandatory paid sick leave; and 6) Support full funding for the Prince George's Regional Medical Center, and ensure the viability of its Cardiac Care Center by opposing a similar center in Anne Arundel County. The General Assembly session ends on April 10th.
