At Last: The Big BOOM Presentation: The University of Maryland Geology Department will be giving a presentation regarding their process and the results of their study here in the Town of Cheverly on April 26th at 6:30PM. Be there!

If you recall, students at the University of Maryland placed seismic monitors throughout Wards 1 and 2 last March for a 4 week period of time to try to help us identify the location of where the Cheverly Booms might be originating. This was the first time UMD'e Geology department utilized this technology and the process of getting to a final result has taken some time. However, they are now ready to unveil their results.

The Town will make the materials available after the meeting via the Town Website. This is a big deal, and I hope to see many of you in attendance, especially to show our appreciation to the UMD staff and students for their help. The town also plans to award the \$2,500 Reward Check at this meeting.

Tax Assessment Appeals Second Chance: Everyone in Cheverly received a new Tax Assessment earlier this year. Your Assessment is extremely important in the calculation of your Property Tax and if you feel it is too high you should appeal your assessment as a manner to keep your Property Taxes lower.

Of course, the date to file an appeal has passed, but I want to relay that many Cheverly residents (including me) appealed their assessment and the results were successful with assessments being lowered from \$10,000 to \$75,000. Most people I've spoken to have mentioned that the process seemed very fair.

During the appeal period I met with many residents to discuss their appeals. I want everyone to know that as expected; some resident's assessments seemed low, some on target and some very high (the Goldilocks theory). Obviously, I spoke to more residents who had very high assessments, but I did counsel many folks that their assessments seemed about right.

I'm sure you're wondering why I am mentioning this if the deadline for appealing your assessment has passed. It's because I want you to mark your calendar for January of next year to file an appeal. The appeal process occurs every year (not every three years) and if you wish you had appealed this year, then the opportunity is open to you next year.

Special Thanks to Susan Pruden: Cheverly residents were benefited in the appeals process by the work of Susan Pruden. The absolute best way to for a resident to appeal their assessment is to review comparable homes that have sold in the last year. Sales Comps is how the Tax Assessment Department states it creates the assessed value, so the best way to contest their assessment is provide Sales Comps of your own.

Susan happily shared Sales Comp data with all Cheverly residents and ci-hosted two meeting to help Cheverly residents understand the appeals process better. Thank You!

Beautifying the Cheverly Ave Bump-outs: Last Fall the Town Council authorized the Town Administrator to identify a landscaper to develop plans to beautify the Bump-Outs that are on Cheverly Avenue. The guidance was to identify plants that: did not block driver vision, provided color, drought resistant, hardy, required limited maintenance, and if possible native species.

The Landscaper delivered the plans and the Council asked the Green Infrastructure Committee to review them and provide comments. While not all comments were included, the Green Infrastructure Committee added valuable input to the plan.

The Council voted to approve the plan In March and with luck and good weather the Bump-Outs will be planted during May.

Budget Season Approaches: In their March work session the Town Council began preliminary discussions about the budget, reviewing expense and revenue data since FY2009. The discussion centered on trying to identify an appropriate three-year strategy for managing the tax rate and the resulting tax revenues. Understanding previous three-year strategies and their implications was important:

FY10 – FY12: Maintain the tax rate at .48 while assessments grew marginally year over year. This allowed the council to increase the fund balance, while still performing limited capital projects: approximately 650K / year. The three-year cycle prior to this period was exceptionally tight with limited dollars to spend on capital.

FY13 – FY15: Hold on tight! This was an extremely difficult time for the town as property assessments dropped over 21%. Even when the council raised the tax rate to .58 the overall revenue from property tax dropped slightly. During these years the council made difficult decisions like limiting capital spending, freezing operating positions, limiting cost of living raises, etc. Through excellent financial management by staff we were able to grow the fund balance slightly during these years and hold expenses flat.

FY16 – FY18: Return to Normalcy: As assessment values increased, property tax revenues increased, thankfully we also benefited from an increase in other revenue sources (primarily income taxes and red-light cameras). During this period the council has been marginally decreasing the tax rate, from .58 to .54, in an effort to slow the growth in your property taxes. However, the council also needed to address long standing capital and operating spending deficits. During this period capital spending has averaged over 1.2M and the fund balance has grown.

Mike, Why the Budget History? I think it's important for everyone to know where we are at and how we got here. Each three-year period has been carefully considered by the council at the beginning and a strategy evolved.

As we enter this new three-year cycle we are in a very good financial position. Our fund balance has been growing is now at 3M, we have managed to hold operating expenses to an annual growth factor of %2 since FY10 (%1 since FY11), and we have increased capital spending.

So, the basics are strong, and given that property assessments should continue to grow at %5 over the next three years the basics continue to be strong. So, while the council has not settled on an overall strategy over the next three years; we will continue to focus on containing operating spending, continue to address capital needs, and limit the growth of the fund balance. The result of this should mean a reduction in the tax rate again this year although the amount will not be settled until the April work session.

What are Capital Improvements?: Capital Improvements are basically improvements made to the infrastructure of the town: New trucks and vehicles for the Police and Public Works, improvements to Town Hall, our fields, our parks, our playgrounds and our buildings. Of course, one of our largest expenses is the maintenance of our streets, curbs and gutters. These are all expensive projects and many of them have been put off for far too long as we have only recently achieved an appropriate balance between revenue and capital and expense projects.

Between FY10 and FY15 the town addressed very serious needs to replenish our fleet of vehicles. Many of our Police Vehicles and PW Trucks were over eight years old and some as much as twelve to fifteen years old. The council has caught up with the vehicle maintenance and is now in the process of trying to purchase three new police cars a year and one or two new trucks for public works.

However, we are still behind in road maintenance. We have been extremely lucky to have had WSSC replace so many of our roads over the last 5 years, including Cheverly Avenue which was a multi-million-dollar project. However, we still have much to do including a real focus on addressing sidewalks throughout town. We have been hobbled by the state government and their lack of funding county and local government Highway Revenues.

This year we are targeting spending the completion of Lake Avenue resurfacing from Forest Ave to Kilmer Road. This project alone is 175K to complete and we will only be receiving 150K from state Highway Revenues. Yet the council wants to do more; more sidewalks and more roads.

Our Town Hall is frequently used and this year we funded the upgrade of the entry systems, and a new air conditioning system for the front of the building. Yet there is still more to do. The air conditioner for the gym now needs to be replaced, and the technology in the buildings needs to be upgraded.

But What About Future Infrastructure?: Looking towards the future, there are larger projects that need to be addressed. The Town Council has funded the design for a brand new Public Works building. While

this project may not begin until FY20 or FY21 this is a large project. Of course, we will use bonds to pay for it but the price tag will likely exceed 2M.

The council also continues to look at constructing a bike path that will afford faster and more convenient access to the Anacostia River Trail, improvements to intersections to improve the safety of our children, improvements to 6301 Kilmer and eventually the construction of a Dog Park.

Please Take A Look: Inside the newsletter you will see a flyer regarding a program from Prince George's County that provide 0% interest loans on home improvements made to eliminate health hazards, meet safety or code compliance standards, install energy efficient products, or install necessary ADA compliance features.

What is Happening with the Dog Park?: My apologies in not publishing an update recently. However, up until last week we really didn't have an update to publish. As you know, we have been working with the State Highway Association for the last six to eight months to obtain a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that would allow us to lease their property behind the Public Works building for the Dog Park.

The process was prolonged do to personnel changeover and confusion between me and SHA. That said, we had completed the negotiations regarding the MOU and were about to sign when SHA uncovered another issue.

The land we are trying to use for the dog park was originally obtained with funds from the US Govt. Apparently, in order as a condition to the use of funds is a limit of use to the property. Therefore, if we are to use the land we must purchase it.

While this is unfortunate and will create at least a 6 to 8 month delay I am hoping that it is not a backbreaker. The process as articulated by SHA is:

Confirm the area we are agreeing to purchase. SHA will clear the property internally. A conveyance plat will work up by SHA. The conveyance plat will be used for appraisals.

SHA will get its own appraisal, but there are situations were an appraisal by the purchaser yields better results.

SHA is then required by law to offer the property to the County.

SHA and the Town of Cheverly would then negotiate on a purchase price. This can be done simultaneously with the offer to the County.

The Town would then sign a bid form

All information would be forwarded to the Secretary of Transportation with our recommendation for sale

The information would then go to the Board of Public Works for approval.

If there is any good news about this, it is that SHA is now totally engaged in trying to make this work and that I expect the property will not be very expensive. I will continue to keep you informed and I apologize for the delay.

New Homes Coming to Joslyn Place: As everyone knows a local developer built 3 new homes on Joslyn Place in the last two years. The same developer owns all of the undeveloped lots on either side of Joslyn Place. He has had plans to develop these lots since the early 2000's.

Two years ago, the Town of Cheverly asked the county to ensure that there was a holistic storm water plan for the area, prior to allowing the remaining homes to be built. It was the Town's position that there were already significant storm water issues downhill from these lots and that any development required attention to existing problems as well as any new storm water problems that might be caused. The county agreed and required the developer to develop a holistic plan. That plan has been completed and approved by the county and addresses many issues. The county and the developer expect the plans to be approved soon, so expect new homes to be built along Joslyn Place.

Town Park Improvement Plans: More than three

years ago the Town together with the Cheverly Green Infrastructure Committee and the Neighborhood Design Center worked together with the community to update the Master Plan for our Town Park. Recent improvements to the stage area and disabled access to the pavilion were the first steps in this plan. These improvements were made utilizing Program Open Space grants which pay for 75% of all costs associated with project. Well, Phase II is about to commence. The Town will be moving the existing basketball courts to the Tennis Court area, expanding the area for basketball. These courts will be multi-use courts, so they will be striped for games such as futsal and street hockey as well. An example of this type of court can be found behind the Cheverly Station Apartments along Oak Street. This project will also be 75% funded by Program Open Space grants. So of course, the question is what will happen to the area where the basketball courts are today. This will be converted to a "gathering space" or pavilion. This will be a passive community space which should be a great complement for our community market.

Columbia Park Road Re-Paving: I've had a few folks ask when this will happen. The Town has spoken to State Highway Administration and the County and this effort is planned for this paving season. I know that sounds vague, but at least it is planned.

VOLVED: Team Cheverly has replaced C-PACT as Cheverly's Neighborhood Watch Organization and policing platform from 2018 into the future. C-PACT had done a wonderful job for the Cheverly community and many of its successful programs will continue. However, Team Cheverly more aptly describes the partnership that the Cheverly Police would like to maintain with our residents. As you already know, cheverlypolice.org will be the main portal by which the police can share information, provide lookouts and update crime issues, and share our services with the community. How you reach the portal is decided by which political ward you reside in. For example, if you live in Ward 1, use would simply use Team1@cheverlypolice.org; Ward 2 residents would use Team2@cheverlypolice.org, and so on. To join, simply send an email with the words "I would like to join" to the appropriate Team address and we will add you to the mailing list.

Services that available through the portal include:

- * Latest crime statistics.
- * Lookouts tailored to each Ward.
- * General news and announcements.
- * Request for home security surveys.
- * Requests for House Checks (at least two days in advance or call the office).
- * General crime prevention and deterrence ideas.
- * Notifications of street lights out.
- * Notifications of abandoned or unlicensed vehicles.
- * Questions about general community problems answered.
- * Confidential information will be handled appropriately.

As many of you are aware, the CPD has lost four of our officers in recent months. All have moved on to bigger agencies with more advancement opportunities, different policing venues, and the availability to transfer to specialized units. We wish each of these officers the best in the futures and offer a hearty thanks for their years of service to the Cheverly community. In the interim, the CPD will be short-staffed and we are asking the community to keep a sharp lookout for suspicious persons, vehicles, and incidents. While we regret the loss of these veteran officers, we would also like to announce that three new candidates will be attending a local police academy in the coming week and at least one more in another month. These Cheverly recruits will be in training for the next seven months before they start three months of field training here in the Town. We wish each of these candidate's good luck.

BEWARE OF FAKE IRS EMAILS AND TELE- PHONE CALLS: It is that time of the year again where scammers, pretending to the IRS agents or employees, ferociously attempt to coerce unsuspecting residents into believing there have pending criminal or civil actions against them. If these scammers are successful in this coercion, they then attempt to force the resident to forward some type of payment to a specified location that ultimately has nothing to do with the government. These scammers have the lingo and threat level down to a science and may often utilize the IRS name and logo or fake websites to conduct their illegal business.

Scammers often send an email or place a telephone call to lure victims into giving up their personal and financial information. The crooks then use this information to commit identity theft or steal your money. Some call their victims to demand payment on a prepaid debit card or by wire transfer. According to federal regulations, the IRS will not initiate contact with you to ask for this information by phone or email.

Scammers often send an email or place a telephone call to lure victims into giving up their personal and financial information. The crooks then use this information to commit identity theft or steal your money. Some call their victims to demand payment on a prepaid debit card or by wire transfer. According to federal regulations, the IRS will not initiate contact with you to ask for this information by phone or email.

If you get this type of 'phishing' email, the IRS offers this advice:

- Don't reply to the message.
- Don't open any attachments or click on any links. They may have malicious code that will infect your computer.
- Don't give out your personal or financial information.
- Forward the email to phishing@irs.gov. Then delete it.

If you get an unexpected phone call from someone claiming to be from the IRS:

- Ask for a call back number and an employee badge number.
- If you think you may owe taxes, call the IRS at 800-829-1040. IRS employees can help you.
- If you don't owe taxes or have no reason to think that you do, call the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration at 800-366-4484 to report the incident.
- You should also report it to the Federal Trade Commission by using their "FTC Complaint Assistant" on FTC.gov. Please add "IRS Telephone Scam" to the comments of your complaint.

Be alert to scams that use the IRS as a lure.

IT IS TIME FOR "OPERATION SPRING CLEANING": Every Spring, the Department initiates a program of out of state registration enforcement called "Spring Cleaning." Residents of Maryland, including homebuyers, people leasing apartments or homes, or anyone residing in Maryland for more than 60 days must obtain Maryland registration plates and a driver's license or face stiff penalties and/or vehicle impoundment. In addition to observation, tax records and rental license agreements will be used to determine how long a person has resided in Maryland. Please make every effort to conform to the law within those 60 days.

MONTHLY STATISTICS: The CPD is in the process of switching over to the County's new records management system. After 40 of training on this new system, reports are starting to be generated that will ultimately make records collection easier and data dissemination more accurate. In the interim, the monthly crime statistics will not be available.
