Board of Elections Update

Did you miss your chance to register to vote in the State of Maryland? Want to participate in the upcoming Town elections - you still can! The Town of Cheverly is allowing residents to vote in Town elections even if you are not registered to vote in state-wide or federal elections.

The voter registration application for Cheverly voters is available on the Town website and on the QR codes below:

Copies of the document are available at Town Hall, copies are also available outside of Town Hall for no-contact pick-up, and were recently printed in the April 2021 Town Newsletter.

Residents who are registered outside the State of Maryland may also be able to vote in Town Elections, if they meet the criteria to register to vote in the Town of Cheverly. Residents may also submit an application to Town Hall on Tuesdays or Wednesdays between the hours of 10:00 am and 3:00 pm.

The application contains information on what documentation you will need to provide to register to vote in Town elections. The Board of Elections Supervisors will also hold a **Voter Registration Drive** on **Wednesday April 21**, **2021** in front of Town Hall between the hours **5:00pm** and **7:00pm**. In addition, voters will be allowed to register to vote on Election Day, Monday May 3, by coming to Town Hall during the time the polls are open (polls are open from 7:00am to 8:00pm) and you can be guided through the process of registering onsite.

Friday, April 23, 2021

Final day to request an absentee ballot.

Absentee ballot application requests submitted on Friday, April 23rd must be picked up in person from the Cheverly Community Center.

Friday, April 30, 2021

Last day to file as a certified write-in candidate.



Monday, May 3, 2021 ELECTION DAY

All voting will take place at the Cheverly Community Center. **COVID-19 protocols will be in place.**

Voter Registration Information

Registering to vote in the Town of Cheverly **DOES NOT** authorize you to vote in any other elections.

You must register to vote in person. You may come to Town Hall on Tuesdays or Wednesdays between the hours of 10:00 am and 3:00 pm., to the Voter Registration Drive on April 21 between 5:00 pm and 7:00 pm at Town Hall or on Election Day, May 3, 2021 before the polls close at 8:00 pm.

The Town of Cheverly does not register voters by political party.

Requirements:

- ✓ Be a resident of the Town of Cheverly,
 Maryland for at least 30 days prior to the Town election.
- ✓ Be at least 18 years of age by the next Town election.
- ✓ Not have been convicted of a felony and currently serving a court-ordered sentence of imprisonment for the conviction.
- ✓ Not have been convicted of buying or selling votes.
- Not be under guardianship for mental disability or, if you are, not have been found by a court of competent jurisdiction by clear and convincing evidence that you cannot communicate, with or without accommodations, a desire to participate in the voting process.

Bring your photo identification and required documentation with you to the Town Hall, 6401 Forest Road, Cheverly, MD 20875.

- (1) Photo identification or an identification card issued by a federal, state, or local government entity of the United States or any foreign country or school provided that the identification document contains a photograph and/or identifying information such as name, date of birth, gender, height, and eye color. Examples of acceptable documentation could include a U.S. or foreign passport, visa, alien registration card, driver's license, MVA identification card, military identification, or school ID with photo; and
- (2) Document that establishes current residence in

the Town of Cheverly if not already established by (1) above. Examples could include copy of a deed, house or apartment lease, utility bill, paycheck, bank statement, school record, or other official or government document that shows your name and current address in the Town of Cheverly.

Ballot Drop Box

There is a Ballot Drop Box in front of Town Hall. It is secure and under surveillance 24 hours a day. Residents may drop their ballot in the box anytime before the polls close at 8:00 pm on Election Day, May 3, 2021.

Covid-19 Voting Day Guidelines

Covid-19 guidelines will be followed for those voting in person on election day. Masks will be required, and social distancing implemented for the safety of all. Volunteers will assist with the flow of voters as well as sanitizing surfaces and pens throughout the day.

Absentee Voting

Voters of Cheverly! Election Day 2021 will be here before you know it!

If you would like to request an absentee ballot, you may do so this year without providing a reason. The voter registration application for Cheverly voters is available on the Town website and on the QR codes below:

Applications may be returned to Town Hall to the secure (blue) mailbox that has been installed to the left of the glass entry doors at Town Hall (applications are also located near this mailbox). The final day to request an absentee ballot will be Friday April 23, 2021.

Applications are subsequently approved by the Board and then a ballot package will be mailed to you or you can arrange for it to be picked up at Town Hall. Absentee ballots are then returned to Town Hall - you can drop your ballot in the official State of Maryland Ballot Box that has been installed in front of Town Hall - or may be mailed to the Town. Ballots must be received by Election Day, Monday May 3, 2021 in order for them to be counted.

Certified Write-In Candidate

The Cheverly Town Council is up for election on Monday May 3, 2021. Anyone interested in running for council who missed the petitioning deadline still has the opportunity to run as a certified write-in candidate. Certified write-in candidates will have their names posted alongside the sample ballots (though their names will not appear on the ballot, it will be indicated the individual has been designated as a certified write-in candidate). Any voter may write in any name as a write-in candidate; however, certified write-in candidates are granted official standing to contest the outcome of election results.

Applications for write-in candidates are due by Friday, April 30, 2021, though interested individuals are encouraged to submit their paperwork in advance of

Marverly Nettles

Hi. I'm Marverly Nettles, your candidate for Town Councilmember for Ward 1. Since moving to Cheverly, I've quickly immersed myself into various organizations. As the call for police reform grew, Cheverly Police started rewriting policies, and PCAB took a leadership role in gathering input from the community.

Moving forward, Cheverly will be gaining neighbors in the middle of Ward 1 within 3 years with the redevelopment of Hospital Hill. It's important that we consider all possible avenues and their impact on our community. I look forward to hearing from you and working with the County to achieve Cheverly's vision. Mere days after I filed for reelection, I was formally offered a once-in-a-career assignment at my workplace. The details have had to remain confidential until the transition is officially announced later this week, but I can say it is an as-

signment that will require my full attention. The unfortunate timing of the offer vis-à-vis the town's election calendar, combined with the urgent nature of the assignment, leaves me with two options—to continue to campaign and potentially win the election, knowing that the nature of my work will leave me with little time to devote to Council; or to withdraw now, knowing that any candidate that might want to run for my seat against my current opponent would need to run as a write-in candidate. I am officially withdrawing from the election. I don't know a lot about the other candidate for the Ward 3 Council seat. Some quick googling leads me to believe that he and I hold very different views about a great number of things. I am not sure how his experience and values might impact our town. I will say it is my sincere hope that a Ward 3 resident will step forward to launch a write-in campaign in order to provide residents with an alternative choice.

I have real, legitimate concerns about the ways in which current leadership is negatively impacting staff morale, intergovernmental relationships, future development opportunities, and authentic equity and inclusion. It is my hope that the council can continue to address these concerns and that their good-faith efforts are understood as such

To those residents who have supported and encouraged me—I thank you from the bottom of my heart. I'm sorry I can't realize the potential that we know I am capable of as an elected leader, and I hope you won't feel your faith and trust has been misplaced. I acknowledge that I am opting for an easier path, and that my even having this choice is the result of a massive amount of privilege. I own that in this moment, I am choosing my career, family, and own well-being in stepping away from serving my community. One day I may find myself in a position to serve the town again in some capacity. In the meantime I will continue to support the Town of Cheverly as much as I can as a resident.

She garnered membership in Alpha Lambda Delta and Golden Key International Honor Society. Mrs. Munyeneh started her career as a Grants Management Specialist for the South Carolina Attorney General's Office. After relocating to the District of Columbia, Mrs. Munyeneh was hired as the first

domestic violence victim advocate for the Metropolitan Police Department. She worked with a team to address all victimization in the District of Columbia and was instrumental in creating what is now known today as the Victim Services Branch. She worked at the National Center for Victims of Crime at the same time, while also serving as an Adjunct Professor for the Department of Homeland Security's FLETC Domestic Violence Intervention Program. In her tenure, she has served over forty thousand victims of crime.

Mrs. Munyeneh extended her advocacy role to supporting her colleagues and staff when she was elected as Chief Shop Steward of the National Association for Government Employees. She served as a Certified EEO Counselor to all District of Columbia employees which laid the groundwork for labor management partnerships with the Metropolitan Police Department and the Department of Forensic Science. Mrs. Munyeneh ultimately transitioned into conducting investigations as an Employee Labor Relations Manager and contract EEO Investigator/Reviewer. Ready for a new challenge, she joined the federal government and serves as a Program Manager for the Office of Civil Rights and Diversity and liaison for the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion team.

In her "spare" time, Mrs. Munyeneh serves as a Mount Hope Commission Board Member, Ward 4 Councilmember, and Vice Mayor for the Town of Cheverly. Some of her notable accomplishments have included:

- Getting the 4th Ward and the rest of the Town of Cheverly that was initially left out of the Historic District, included as part of the Historic District efforts with the Historic Preservation Commission.

- Removing the plantation from the Town Seal.
- Forging a partnership with Prologis to preserve tree canopy and the integrity of the neighborhood while addressing development near Ward 4.
- Securing the installation of new sidewalks in Ward 4 and beyond.
- Providing community training on "Radical Listening" with the Mount Hope Commission.
- Authoring the In Defense of Black Lives Resolution.
- Proposing the COVID Relief Fund to help some of our neighbors in need.
