What is your November 3rd voting plan? Yes, it's important to act now!

Please don't wait to plan for voting on November 3rd. As Congressman Lewis's words remind us, "The vote is the most powerful nonviolent tool we have." As passionately as I love to vote in person, I still will likely vote by mail this November, in an effort to protect myself and others in response to the continued uncertainty of COVID-19. VOTE BY MAIL in the November election, the current direction is that YOU NEED TO RE-QUEST A VOTE BY MAIL APPLICATION! At this time, ballots will NOT be automatically

mailed to registered voters. Request a Vote by Mail Application for the November 3, 2020 Presidential General Election at this link <u>https://tinyurl.com/lsdma9b</u>. Note: the application can appear confusing, as it is also the same application that you would use to register to vote. Your information must match your records, and you will need your driver's license number, ID number, or Learner's Permit number. Great news is that you can also text "VBM" to 77788 to receive the application on your cell phone! Questions or difficulties? Need help with a paper form? Please reach out.

Preparing for local elections—Charter proposals and community conversation.

Mayor and Council are considering non-citizen voting in preparation for the next Town election. As this is a Charter amendment, a public hearing is required and the proposed legislation will be offered for review over the span of three Town meetings. The Cheverly Board of Election Supervisors shared recommendations with the Mayor and Council at the July 23 Worksession, and is planning a forum to hear from community. Community volunteers are essential to making our local elections work here in Town. It's not too early to think about serving on the Board of Election Supervisors or as an Election Judge. Town elections are the first Monday in May, and, although we hope to be able to freely gather by then, we'll need to give thought to measures necessary to support an emergency vote by mail plan.

The Craftsman Building—buyer interested in purchasing for a distribution center.

The site of the former Craftsman printing press is home to an $170,000 \text{ ft}^2$ warehouse. The Town has been contacted by an attorney representing a client interest in the site for use as a distribution center. We have clearly expressed that we are very concerned regarding the impact of yet another transportation intensive industrial use affecting our community. This site has unique potential and the owner has been open to creative uses. We appreciate the transparency in contacting the Town and we are communicating our concerns with this industrial use and the site's potential.

Update on Washington Gateway Project (Prologis and Amazon).

The Prince George's County Planning Board voted to approve the Preliminary Plan of Subdivision PPS 419048_01 for the Washington Gateway Project on July 16, 2020. The site owner and developer is Prologis, and the expected tenant is Amazon. The plan is for a warehouse serving "last mile" delivery. The project is located at 5801 Columbia Park Rd.

Cheverly supported the developer's application for Preliminary Plan of Subdivision with conditions. Prior to the Town's involvement, Prologis had already made key environmental commitments to LEED certification and an expanded tree canopy, use of larger caliper trees in reforestation and use of native plants. Since the Town's involvement, we've worked with Prologis for them to agree to over 20 additional conditions (transportation, Old 4th Ward impact, environment, collector road/additional access to site). Prologis has also committed to listen to and address Town and community concerns and to be a good neighbor for issues still before us. Additionally, the Town and Prologis will be scheduling regular monthly meeting with Prologis to track progress on these conditions and to establish a strong working relationship. Major gains include support for limiting construction of a road in favor of additional reforestation, managing, and deeding over land fronting Columbia Park Rd. to the Town to buffer Cabin Branch, Boyd Park, and residents on 64th Ave., extending reforestation and layered planting behind homes on 62nd Ave., and an Operational Traffic Analysis to include a Community input Zoom session on traffic and safety concerns along Columbia Park Rd.

I want to thank Mr. Reddick, President of the 4th Ward Civic Association, CM Ward 4, Kayce Munyeneh, and all of Council and you—residents from the Old 4th Ward and across Cheverly—for engaging every step of this process. The Town is also grateful for the written advisement of the Cheverly Green Infrastructure Committee and Cheverly Planning Board, and I drew extensively upon their combined report for Cheverly's testimony.

Your help is needed and welcome!

These are key areas where resident action can be instrumental in making this a better project.

1. We Need Your Help! Special Traffic Meeting Ahead! One of the conditions put forward by the Town seeks to better address traffic concerns on Columbia Park Rd. The developer is conducting a Traffic Operational Analysis and has agreed to host a Zoom session with their civil and traffic engineers to gain Cheverly input for the Traffic Operational Analysis to include perspectives from pedestrians, bicyclists, school buses, and metro buses. Once we have a date in hand, we will ask you to pack the Zoom!

2. Be involved in the upcoming 18-24-month review of the Master Plan of Transportation

The Town of Cheverly will be fully engaged in the upcoming review of the Master Plan of Transportation, not only for the removal of Master Plan Road C-404, but with a look to addressing revisions that can pull pass-through traffic away from the Columbia Park Road bridge and intersections. We will also be requesting that this industrial area be considered for a Transportation Demand Management (TDM) approach with a focus on driving Metro rail and bus ridership; the use of shuttles; commitments in support of bikeshare, and bicycle and pedestrian improvements. We have to rethink transportation in our area. It makes good development, economic, and community sense.

3. Stand ready to require reasonable conditions from Amazon

We need to figure this piece out and I would welcome a hive-mind approach to this.

I think that we need to seek County support for a collective request for reasonable conditions from Amazon and we may need a savvy "campaign" to gain traction with Amazon. The close proximity of our Metro rail and bus lines are an asset to Amazon's operations and Amazon has made significant commitments to incentivizing use of public transportation (including subsidies for employees and contractors, extensive shuttle support, bike-share and pedestrian-friendly supports) for their larger fulfillment centers and corporate offices. It is a reasonable expectation that Amazon aggressively support similar measures at a smaller scale at here in Cheverly in an effort to reduce the anticipated 900+ employee commuting trips per day. Similarly, Amazon has worked with communities to ensure that their delivery vans do not use neighborhood streets as cut-throughs and has provided phone hotlines for communities to report violations. Requesting the same level of commitment for our community is only reasonable and is the foundation of building a long-term, good neighbor relationship.

COVID-19, and Town services and operations.

There have been disturbing increases in community transmission of COVID-19 across the country and the end of July numbers/trends in Maryland show an uptick in cases and hospitalizations. In our County, the trending numbers aren't yet definitive, but should cause us to pause. We need to rededicate ourselves to taking the full and proper wearing of face-coverings, respecting physical distancing, and avoiding congregating (especially in indoor spaces), with the life or death seriousness of a pandemic. Please regard all of these practices not as restrictions, but rather as a shared social responsibility and community good to keep our friends and neighbors as safe as we can in this uncertainty. You can follow Prince George's County numbers.

Connect and be informed—PGCPS re-opening and distance learning.

I completely support PGCPS' decision to stay out of the physical classroom through at least January 29, 2021 to protect the health of all involved, and I share the many broad-reaching questions and concerns of fellow parents. Please don't go this alone! Here in Cheverly, reach out to other families in your student's school and develop a support network. If you are already in a group, please make an extra special effort to seek out and welcome other parents not yet connected. Everything related to PGCPS depends on the information in SchoolMax. Town staffing and delivery of services.

Town Administrator Galloway, in partnership with Chief Towers and Public Works Director Brayman, have maintained a focus both on keeping their staff safe in the time of COVID-19 and on providing responsive Town services and supports. Our staff is experiencing the same COVID-19 impacts as all of us and juggling distance learning and children at home through at least the end of January has to be part of workplan and staffing discussions. Staff is upping technology and thinking through how to continue to serve residents for whom technology is not a fix.

Town Administration is operating almost entirely remotely. Our Code Compliance officers have structured their schedules to maintain physical distancing and follow PPE protocols for any individual community contact. The Cheverly Police Department has taken a number of non-emergency services online and has made operational modifications to limit the opportunity for transmission between officers and with the public. Our Public Works Department can't operate remotely and there is no standing back up should Public Works employees need to isolate or quarantine. Director Brayman continues to focus on distancing and scheduling to provide crews with an eye to safety and operability, but word is that a return to full operational status is unlikely within this calendar. In response to community requests, Public Works has found a way to extend bulk trash pickup to the second and fourth Thursday of each month. Please thank them from a healthy distance!

Evictions, unemployment, foreclosures-short-term protection and long-term concern.

Tenants continue to be protected from eviction, late fees, penalties, and rent increases. This protection extends through to 90 days after the expiration of the Governor's emergency order. If you are having difficulty paying part or all of your rent—contact your property manager or landlord. Tenants are still responsible for paying rent. Rent has NOT been forgiven or erased! Many property managers and landlords are accepting partial payments and arranging individual repayment plans and want tenants to understand that there is no fear or shame in being impacted by COVID-19. If you are a homeowner facing mortgage difficulties, please do not wait or stay silent. You may have foreclosure and repayment protections. There is no risk in reaching out for assistance. Housing Initiative Partnership is a wonderful resource for both homeowners and tenants and is offering remote assistance throughout the pandemic. As I write this entry, we still don't have final word on the latest CARES Act legislation, and, as of the middle of July, the number of Marylanders filing for unemployment had risen to close to 500k. If you are having difficulty navigating filing for unemployment or following submitting your application, please don't hesitate to reach out for referral.

The foundational work before our Cheverly Police Department

It's been over two months since the murder of George Floyd and since we viewed the searing images of a Black man slowly dying under the knee and eyes of officers charged with the care of community. The callous brutality of the murder of Mr. Floyd threw the racism that still permeates our country into stark relief and has given rise to the largest protest movement in the history of our nation. Although the discussion of racism in America involves every aspect of society, accountability in

policing and race, the connection between warrior mentality and police brutality, and the reliance on police to step forward as first responders for issues involving homelessness, addiction, and mental illness, have become an urgent focus in communities across the country, including in our Cheverly community. Our Town has its own harmful legacy that extended racially biased policing practices toward Black and Brown people. Listening to perspectives of residents who have viewed the progression of our Town through a lens of many decades, I understand both that we have come to a much better place in our policing practices, and that we still have a great deal of work ahead.

We are fortunate to have a department that is committed to this essential and difficult work. Chief Towers stepped into his position dedicated to the transformation and organizational development of our Cheverly Police Department. Faced with Town-wide budget cuts in response to COVID-19, Chief Towers reorganized his departmental budget to find a way to prioritize bringing in professional resources to assist in structuring the training, mentorship, supervision, evaluation, and accountability of our Cheverly Police Department. In parallel, the department is focusing on policy reform, beginning with funding expert advisement on drafting a use of force policy that reflects the best of policing best practices in reporting, investigation, discipline, accountability, and increased transparency and is grounded in the protection of human life and rights. Across our community, we will grapple with very real fears for the safety and dignity of Black and Brown lives within our community; what transformation looks like; the urgency of now; and who defines and owns this work. Our community is in a place of vulnerability. I encourage each of us to both make space to listen and be uncomfortable and to step forward to be heard as our police department and community navigates this process.

Town Meeting - July 9

Reminder to residents: Pools

The Town Code defines a Swimming Pool as follows:

Any artificially constructed, non-portable pool capable of being used for swimming, bathing or wading, having a depth of two (2) feet or more at any point.

The Town Code defines a Portable Pool as follows: a pool which is not built into the ground, which can be moved from place to place, and which can contain water of a depth of two (2) feet or more.

The Town Code defines a Wading as follows:

any pool not normally in excess of one foot deep at its maximum depth and usually reserved for use by small children.

Sec. 25-5. - Public and private swimming pools.

This type of pool shall conform to all requirements of Prince George's County.

Sec. 25-4. - Town requirements.

(a) Private swimming pools, excluding the apron, shall not be any nearer than eight (8) feet from the side or rear lot lines or from any house, building or residence. All such pools shall be at least fifteen (15) feet back of the front building line, but in no event shall any such pool extend beyond the front of any existing house on any adjacent lot.

(b) All electrical wiring, fixtures and services in and around a pool must conform to the requirements of the Prince George's County department of licenses and permits. (c) All private swimming pools to be constructed or which are already constructed shall be enclosed by a fence which shall be at least six (6) feet in height, at least twenty-five (25) percent open unless an exception is granted by the mayor and council, and which shall otherwise conform to the standards of Prince George's County for fencing around swimming pools. The fence shall be of a type not readily climbed by children. The gate shall be of a self-closing and self-latching type, with a latch on the inside of the gate not readily available for children to open.

(d) The town building inspector, town administrator or any member of the police department shall have the right, at any reasonable hour, to inspect any private swimming pool for the purposes of determining that all provisions of this section are fulfilled or complied with.

Sec. 25-7. - Portable pools.

It shall be unlawful for any person to maintain a portable pool for the purpose of swimming, bathing, wading or other uses, having a depth of two (2) feet or more at any point, unless such pool is enclosed by a fence which shall be six (6) feet in height, at least twenty-five (25) percent open, unless an exception is granted by the mayor and council, and which shall be of a type not readily climbed by children. The gate shall be of a self-closing and self-latching type, with a latch on the inside of the gate not readily available for children to open. These pools must meet the requirements of Prince George's County.



Online Reporting

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the department implemented an online reporting system for some non-emergency calls for service. These calls include auto tampering, destruction of property/property damage, lost property, theft from autos, and certain other thefts that don't rise to the level of burglary. Residents are encouraged to utilize this system, in lieu of the non-emergency number, for incidents that meet the requirements.

Upon submittal, residents should expect a call from one of our officers to either gather further information, or to provide the respective case number.

Once completed, the reports can be obtained, by request, via <u>reports@cheverlypolice.org</u>. **Report Requests**

All reports can be requested, via email, at <u>reports@cheverlypolice.org</u>. When submitting your request, please include as much information as possible, that pertains to the report. In addition, for identification purposes, a photocopy of the requesting party's ID will need to accompany the request. In response to the state of emergency, all fees associated with report requests have been waived.

Tips@cheverlypolice.org

Tips@cheverlypolice.org is an email address that residents can use to send non-emergency tips or information to the department. Our investigators are constantly working to investigate criminal cases in which our residents have been victimized. If you have, or believe you have, information, photographs, or video that could assist the department, and you don't want to call, please send us an email. If you see someone in immediate danger, or a crime being committed, dial 911.

Cheverly's Mass Notification System is here! CodeRED allows residents to receive emergency alerts via text, email, or phone call. Upon signing up for the service, users can create a Managed Account, which allows the user to create a username and password and control the following:

- 1. Types of alerts received:
 - a. Emergency Alerts (Mandatory)
 - b. General Alerts (Optional)
 - c. Weather Alerts (Optional, as provided by the National Weather Service)
- 2. Method alerts are received:
 - a. Via text message
 - b. Via email
 - c. Via phone call

Users can also perform a Quick signup however, doing so would require the user to call CodeRED's customer service line in order to make any changes to the account.

Users are required to have either a residential or business address, within the Cheverly limits, in order to sign up for an account. The system supports multiple addresses, phone numbers, and emails. In order to start receiving alerts, residents can sign up using any of the following ways:

Cheverly Village had a special guest at a recent virtual Happy Hour. Jo-Ann Romano, a co-founder of the first winery in our county, shared the story of how she

and her husband started growing grape vines in the soils of a former tobacco farm. As a young person working on my relatives' tobacco farms in the deep south, I would envision having *any* other crops growing around me rather than tobacco. I also longed for more just, equitable relationships among those tending the fields. So, Romano's story of transformation resonated.

The next day we learned that Congressman John Lewis died. Although John Lewis also came from a farming family, he tended souls, not soils. Over decades he helped grow the very soul of our nation. In 2004, Congressman Lewis came to Cheverly's Gladys Noon Spellman Elementary, where over 90% of students were Black and Latinx. This amazing man looked our students in their eyes and challenged them to be their best true selves and to care for their communities. They listened. We all listened. I miss him in this world.

Many of our elders in Cheverly have experiences and perspectives to help tend our Cheverly soil/soul. We have children who need to have more people look into their eyes and tell them they matter. We have grownups who need to hear this, too. We can't afford to ignore or sacrifice anyone. We all provide essential nutrients to our Cheverly soil/soul. Stomping on the soil/ soul is not the way to grow anything, anywhere.

The Air We Breathe - - Cheverly's Air Quality Monitoring Project

Have you noticed something new in town? We have new Air Quality Monitoring (AQM) sensors located at three sites, Town Center, Boyd Park and the Cheverly Swim and Racket Club. Cheverly students and citizen scientists, would you like to get involved? We're looking for volunteers to join the team and learn about The Air We Breathe...see call for participation below!

Why Air Quality Monitoring in Cheverly? Concern about our air quality, due to the close proximity of several heavy industry businesses and major roadways surrounding Cheverly, the Town partnered with the Maryland Institute for Applied Environmental Health at the University of Maryland last year. Dr. Sacoby

Wilson established a laboratory to address community engagement with environmental health and justice at UMD College Park where he and his PhD candidates design local air monitoring sensor networks and analyze the results. Once completed, the Town will have a baseline for gauging the immediate and cumulative effects of industrial developments and traffic.

Cheverly's AQM network includes 26 Purple Air sensors collecting data about particulate matter (PM2.5 microns), a key metric for air pollution. You can see the status of the Cheverly Pool AQM by zooming in on the map at the Purple Air website <u>https://www.purpleair.com/map?opt=1/mAQI/a10/cC0&inc=433023#14.99/38.92272/-76.92348</u>

In addition, Cheverly's network includes two AeroQual sensors that measure PM2.5, ozone and nitrogen dioxide as well as temperature, relative humidity and dew point. These more comprehensive units use mature sensor technology to measure the common pollutants known to have the greatest impact on urban and suburban communities. Once the AQM sensor network is completely installed, the UMD team will implement analysis software to provide the Town with tools and information to better understand current air quality conditions and potential impacts of future developments.

Want to Get Involved? We are seeking volunteers, especially Cheverly high school and college students, who would like to learn about air quality monitoring and help design signs about Cheverly's AQM project. Cheverly will also participate in UMD's student citizen science outreach involving mobile Air Flow 2 monitors (see <u>www.plumelabs.com</u>) in the future.
