MAYOR'S CORNER

Pushing back on COVID-19 fatigue—the risk is real, and we need to protect each other.

COVID-19 has separated us from those we love for so long. Despite the almost irresistible desire to gather, in our homes or around the Yule log at a Town celebration—we have to value each other's lives enough to innovate ways to **stay physically protected and socially connected**. As I write the Mayor's Corner, the CDC has announced that more than 1 million COVID-19 cases were reported in the United States over the last seven days (<u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-nCoV/</u> <u>index.html</u>). In Prince George's County, we have had an over 50% increase in the number of new cases and deaths in the week ending with 11/14. I am not alarmist when I say that I expect the numbers to grow over the next month—and numbers mean lives. I encourage us to look to our neighbors and notice how they are doing and see who needs assistance. Where would a letter drop let someone know they are seen and loved? Where would running an errand and a safe drop-off create a connection? I promise to continue to look for no-contact options to celebrate as a community and welcome your ideas and initiatives. This is where Cheverly can demonstrate the best of what community does for each other. Stay safe and be well.

Find out if you might have been exposed to COVID-19 while preserving your privacy!

On November 10, the Maryland Department of Health (MDH) announced MD COVID Alert, the official COVID-19 Exposure Notifications System for Maryland, available at no cost.

1. If you have an Android, download at https://bit.ly/AndroidMDCOVIDAlert

2. If you have an iPhone, opt-in to Exposure Notifications in your device Settings.

Add your phone to stop the spread. Fight COVID-19.

This system enhances contact tracing efforts by notifying users if they have likely been exposed to COVID-19, allowing them to seek timely medical attention and help protect the people they have come in contact with, including those they might not know directly. *MD COVID Alert was specifically designed to protect the privacy and personal information of users.* Users remain anonymous, their location is never tracked, and no data is collected from their smartphones. Using Bluetooth technology, the system can detect if two devices are near each other without revealing where the devices are or who they belong to.

Non-Citizen Voting Charter Amendment passes and new Election Charter Amendment.

Once in effect, this charter amendment will extend the opportunity for non-citizens to register to vote in municipal elections and allow for creating a supplementary voter list. The requirement that one's primary residence is in the Town for more than thirty (30) days continues to apply to anyone seeking to register to vote in Cheverly municipal elections. Next, Mayor and Council are considering a Charter Amendment that will expand the number of Board of Election Supervisors and allow for mail-in balloting, same-day registration, and an additional (early) day of voting. The Charter Amendment Resolution will involve a three (3) reader process, include public comment, and will proceed to a vote in our February Town Meeting.

The Craftsman Building site has a new owner and developer—do I hear bike trail?!

I love good news! The easement for a bike trail to pass through the former Craftsman property is a go! Atapco, the new owners and developers of the former Craftsman printing press site, supported our request and are working through the specifics. Cheverly will hold the easement. This brings us a step closer to a bike trail. Atapco is planning a new warehouse/ distribution build. This use is not what our community imagined for this space, but it is permitted under the current zoning. We are drawing attention to traffic volume and routing concerns. Looking past this disappointment. I see an opportunity to have a good neighbor relationship with Atapco. I appreciate their early commitment to working with our Cheverly Planning Board (CPB) and Green Infrastructure Committee (GIC), starting with an initial meeting in early December.

All the pretty sidewalks and a budget amendment to get more for less.

The Town has prioritized sidewalk repairs throughout Town in this budget year. Public Works Director Brayman came before Mayor and Council to seek a budget amendment to extend sidewalk work at the current advantageous contract rate of \$6 a square foot, as the new contract rate will increase to \$9 a square foot. Mayor and Council unanimously approved an additional \$200,000 against our fund balance, as this will support other much-needed repairs. In addition to the budget adjustment to extend sidewalk repairs, the Town is applying for CDGB funds to install new sidewalks on 57th Ave. and Newton St., both dangerous high-traffic areas that threaten pedestrian safety. All repairs and installations incorporate accessibility features.

Update on Storm Drains and the September 10 flooding.

Town Administrator Galloway, Public Works Director, Mr. Brayman, and I secured a meeting with the County Department of Public Works and Transportation (DPW&T) and the County Department of the Environment (DoE) at the end of October. In that meeting, we outlined our concerns following the September 10 flooding in Town and drew focus to each area where the stormwater management systems proved inadequate to the need. We shared that the inadequacies resulted in extensive damage to residents' homes and that the severity of the flooding was life-threatening, requiring rescues from vehicles and homes. We have requested information on the ratings (5, 10, 15vr flood) of storm drains in Cheverly and to resolve any mapping discrepancies of the storm drain systems throughout the Town. We also requested a specific assessment of maintenance issues and a presentation on the storm drain systems, expected vs. designed function, and available DPW&T and DoE support and timelines.

The truth is that we face an extended timeline for any significant work or redesign of County stormwater management systems. I was explicitly reminded of this in our most recent conversation with the County. Equally true, the timeline isn't getting any shorter, so we need to engage now. The effects of climate change on our Town will require a multilayered response, and the County storm drain systems are only part of the challenge. We will need to work within neighbor groups to hold, slow down, and otherwise manage water across our private properties.

I say all of this to request your support when it comes to our FY22 budget conversations. This work is expensive and essential. We must prioritize setting aside funding to bring in an engineer with the experience and mindset to advise the Town and work with community on approaches to sustainably address public and private property water woes throughout the Town. We will also need to dedicate Town funds and seek grant opportunities to implement these projects.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING DECEMBER 10, 2020 AT 7:00 PM VIA ZOOM

The Mayor and Town Council have received and reviewed the Petition Request for have a traffic analysis at the intersection of Lockwood Road and Crest Avenue.

(d) Procedures for public hearing on traffic calming petitions:

(1) Conduct of public hearing:

a. After having been notified by the town clerk that a valid petition has been received, the mayor will schedule a public hearing to solicit the opinions of the entire neighborhood and the town at large.

b. The town clerk shall send notice of the public hearing to all residents of the street, or block as the case may be, which is proposed to receive speed hump action, and to the local neigh-

borhood citizen association. The public hearing shall be advertised in the Cheverly Newsletter.

c. After conducting the public hearing and declaring the hearing record closed, the mayor and council shall announce its decision within fifteen (15) days of the close of the hearing record. Under extraordinary circumstances, this time limit may be extended by majority vote of the council.

d. The mayor and council may approve, approve with modifications, or deny the requested speed hump installation. e. The town clerk shall notify the petitioners, and their neighborhood or civic association of the mayor and council's decision, which shall also be published in the Cheverly Newsletter.

(2) Guidelines for evaluating public hearing. The following criteria are intended to guide the mayor and council in determining whether a request for speed hump action is reasonable and justified. These shall not be considered exclusive criteria: a. The street proposed for a speed hump installation has an identified speeding problem which cannot be alleviated in any other reasonable way than by a speed hump installation. Such

a problem can be identified through a combination of resident complaints, police radar surveillance and ticketing practices, accident statistics, or history of previous efforts to control speeding on the street.

b. The street carries a higher volume of nonresidential traffic than would normally be expected.

c. The street has not been identified and is not used by the fire departments serving Cheverly as the primary fire and rescue route into Cheverly.

d. The installation of speed humps be assessed for their potential impact on public transportation.

e. The potential impact of speed humps on adjacent neighborhoods be assessed.

f. A technical study provided by the director of public works commenting on any hill, curve or street conditions of concern in the placement of the desired hump(s) will be assessed.

CHARTER AMENDMENT TO INCREASE THE NUMBER OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF ELECTIONS FROM THREE (3) TO FIVE (5), PER-MIT EARLY VOTING, SAME DAY VOTER REGIS-TRATION AND VOTING, AND VOTING BY MAIL IN TOWN ELECTIONS

Pursuant to § 4-304 of the Local Government Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland, there will be a public hearing on a proposed amendment to the Town of Cheverly, Maryland's Charter to increase the number of Board of Elections Supervisors from 3 to 5, to allow same day voting, to allow early voting, same day voter registration, and voting by mail in Town elections.

Notice of Adoption of Charter Amendment

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the public that pursuant to Article XI-E of the Maryland Constitution, Section 4-304 of the Local Government Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland, and the Charter of the Town of Cheverly, the Mayor and Council of Cheverly, Maryland, at a public meeting assembled on November 12, 2020, duly adopted Charter Amendment Resolution No. R-04-20. The following section of the Town Charter was amended: RESOLUTION AMENDING ARTICLE V OF THE TOWN CHAR-TER TO PROVIDE FOR NON-CITIZEN VOTING AND ESTABLISHING A SUPPLEMENTARY VOTER REGISTRY. The Amendment shall become effective and be considered part of the Charter of the Town of Cheverly on January 1, 2021, unless on or before December 22, 2020, there shall be presented to the Mayor and Council of Cheverly, or mailed to it by registered mail, a petition requesting that the proposed amendment be submitted to referendum to the voters of Cheverly. Said petition shall be signed by twenty percent (20%) or more of the persons who are qualified to vote in municipal elections of the Town of Cheverly. Further information may be obtained by

Online Reporting

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the department implemented an online reporting system for some non-emergency calls for service. These calls include auto tampering, destruction of property/property damage, lost property, theft from autos, and certain other thefts that don't rise to the level of burglary. Residents are encouraged to utilize this system, in lieu of the non-emergency number, for incidents that meet the requirements.

All reports can be requested, via email, at <u>reports@cheverlypolice.org</u>. When submitting your request, please include as much information as possible, that pertains to the report. In addition, for identification purposes, a photocopy of the requesting party's ID will need to accompany the request. In response to the state of emergency, all fees associated with report requests have been waived.

Tips@cheverlypolice.org

Tips@cheverlypolice.org is an email address that residents can use to send non-emergency tips or information to the department. Our investigators are constantly working to investigate criminal cases in which our residents have been victimized. If you have, or believe you have, information, photographs, or video that could assist the department, and you don't want to call, please send us an email. If you see someone in immediate danger, or a crime being committed, dial 911.

Cheverly's Mass Notification System is here! CodeRED allows residents to receive emergency alerts via text, email, or phone call. Upon signing up for the service, users can create a Managed Account, which allows the user to create a username and password and control the following:

- 1. Types of alerts received:
 - a. Emergency Alerts (Mandatory)
 - b. General Alerts (Optional)
 - c. Weather Alerts (Optional, as provided by the National Weather Service)
- 2. Method alerts are received:
 - a. Via text message
 - b. Via email
 - c. Via phone call

Users can also perform a Quick signup however, doing so would require the user to call CodeRED's customer service line in order to make any changes to the account.

Users are required to have either a residential or business address, within the Cheverly limits, in order to sign up for an account. The system supports multiple addresses, phone numbers, and emails.

CXVID-19 (Coronavirus)

Many indoor businesses and establishments must reduce capacity limits to a maximum of 25% capacity, and must follow all safety guidelines.



Restaurants are limited to 25% maximum capacity indoors and 50% maximum capacity outdoors, and must follow all safety guidelines such as social distancing.

Houses of worship must reduce maximum capacity for indoor services to 25%, and outdoor services to 125 persons or less. They must follow all safety guidelines such as social distancing.

This is the Season that we'll be using heating devices and methods inside the home... we are including some tips from <u>ready.gov</u> below:

Portable Space Heaters

- Keep combustible objects at least three feet away from portable heating devices.
- Buy only heaters evaluated by a nationally recognized laboratory, such as Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Check to make the portable heater has a thermostat control mechanism and will switch off automatically if the heater falls over.
- Only use crystal clear K-1 kerosene in kerosene heaters. Never overfill it. Use the heater in a well-ventilated room.

Fireplaces and Woodstoves

- Inspect and clean woodstove pipes and chimneys annually and check monthly for damage or obstructions.
- Use a fireplace screen heavy enough to stop rolling logs and big enough to cover the entire opening of the fireplace to catch flying sparks.
- Make sure the fire is completely out before leaving the house or going to bed.

In the event of a fire, remember that every second counts. Escape plans help you get out of your home quickly. Twice each year, practice your home fire escape plan. Some tips to consider when preparing this plan include:

- Find two ways to get out of each room in the event the primary way is blocked by fire or smoke.
- Make sure that windows are not stuck, screens can be taken out quickly and that security bars can be properly opened.
- Practice feeling your way out of the house in the dark or with your eyes closed.
- Teach children not to hide from firefighters.

You've been hearing about Cheverly's Air Quality Monitoring (AQM) project with the University of Maryland. Find out more about the project directly from the University of Maryland team at the December 10th Town Meeting, 8:00 PM on Zoom.

You can participate in the Air Quality Monitoring project. Here's how:

Join the Community Advisory Board.

The Air Quality Monitoring Community Advisory Board will help guide the Public Health component of the project. The University of Maryland will provide training for folks to use the AQM information and share their knowledge with neighbors. We're hoping for two or three people from different sections of Cheverly especially affected by nearby air pollution sources — the industrial zones south and west of town, and traffic (especially truck traffic) on Rt 50, Rt 202 and the BW Parkway — to contribute about an hour a month for meetings with the UMD team.

Host an air quality sensor outside your home

We are also seeking volunteers to host the Purple Air units outside their homes. Volunteers will provide low level electrical and Wi-Fi access at sites near heavy traffic locations.

If you know people in town who might be interested, for the Board and/or to host sensors, please contact Karen Moe (301-341-9448) for details. This could be a terrific Citizen Science activity for residents, including parents interested in involving their kids! We hope to focus on community training and the benefits of using our evolving AQM system after the holidays.


