



RESIDENTIAL BUSINESS LICENSES


If you are currently operating a business out of your home, you are required to obtain a Town Residential Business License.



Home occupations are under (Chapter 9 of Town Code) and (subtitle 27 of the Prince George's County Code) and do not include any retail business or trade, etc.

Town Residential Business Licenses are issued annually for the Fiscal Year (July 1 to June 30). Please call the Town Clerk at 301-773-8360 or stop by the Town Office to pick up an application form.

The yearly business license fee is \$20.

Public works crews start pick ups at 7:30 AM. Regular Trash, Bulk Trash, Yard Waste and Recycling need to be at the curb before 7AM. Yard Waste and Recycling should not be put in plastic trash bags. Electronics will no longer be picked up with Recycling on Wednesdays. They will be picked on Thursdays or Fridays with Bulk Trash.

Please help the Public Works crew out by <u>not</u> parking in front of the yard waste, trash, recycling, and bulk trash. The picture shows how difficult it can be for the crew when there's a vehicle parked.

TRASH CAN SIZE FOR COLLECTION

Just a reminder, containers are not to exceed thirty-two (32) gallon capacity.



Public Works will not pick up nor empty trash containers larger than 32-gallons. This is for the safety of our Public Works employees who manually lift each and every trash can.

*In the interim, until you purchase a 32-gallon trash can with a tight-fitting lid, please remove all trash bags from cans larger than 32-gallons and place them on the curb prior to trash collection.

TREE EVALUATION PROGAM FOR TOWN RESIDENTS

Did you know you can request one tree inspection per year by the Town's Arborist?

To request a private tree inspection visit the Town website at www.cheverly-md.gov, complete and return the Tree Evaluation Agreement form and submit the \$85 inspection fee.

Fees can be made online or via mail by check. Checks should be made payable to the Town of Cheverly and mailed or dropped off at: Town Hall, Attention Public Works, 6401 Forest Road, Cheverly, MD 20785. Once the inspection is completed the resident will receive a report on their tree. Please note: checks will not be deposited until after the inspection report is completed.

2023 Residential ZONE parking permits will be available December 15th. The price of the permit is \$5 per vehicle. There is a

maximum of 2 quest passes per residence. The first guest pass is free and the second guest pass may be obtained for \$2 fee. (Note:

ONLY two guest passes per address.)

Applications can be downloaded from the Town website at www.cheverly-md.gov under the Form and File tab.

CHEVERLY RENTAL LICENSES

All single-family, multi-family, and roomer rental dwellings in Cheverly are required by Chapter 5 of the Town Code to obtain a Cheverly Rental Housing License.



Licenses are issued annually for the Fiscal Year (July 1 to June 30). Call the Code Compliance Officer at 240-770-7647 for an application.

The yearly rental license fee is \$100.00

Note: Failure to comply with Town Code licensing laws can result in a fine of \$500.

SOLID ANIMAL WASTE ORDINANCE



Sec. 4-10 (a) It shall be unlawful for a person controlling an animal, except a seeing eye dog, to allow or permit solid waste of such animal to

remain on the property of any other person without the consent of the owner or occupant thereof; or on such public properties as are prohibited by order of the Mayor and Council of the Town of Cheverly. Prohibited areas are sidewalks, Gast Park, American Legion Park, Boyd Park, & play areas of all other parks.

VACATIONS & HOME SECURITY

Residents planning to be away for vacations should visit https://www.cheverly-md.gov/cheverly-police-department/ webforms/house-check-request to arrange to have their homes checked while they are gone.

The following items should also be checked to make sure your residence is safe and looks as much as possible like someone is there:

- Cancel newspaper & mail delivery or have a neighbor pick it up for you.
- Arrange for lawn care.
- Store valuables, preferably in a bank.
- Store lawn mowers, bicycles, and lawn furniture inside.
- Set lights inside the house on a timer.
- Set telephone bells as low as possible.
- Draw shades and drapes.
- Lock cars left in the driveway.
- Make sure smoke detectors are working.
- Lock all windows and doors.
- Give your house key & itinerary to at least one friend or neighbor.

GRASS, WEEDS AND OVERGROWTH



Obstructions:

- 1. Residents are reminded that with the nice weather more and more residents are out walking. Please keep the walkways and sidewalks clear of overgrowth, obstructions and hanging limbs.
- 2. If the tree obstructing the sidewalk or roadway is in the planting box, please contact the Department of Public Works.
- 3. Keep vegetation from obstructing the view near intersections.

Lot Maintenance:

1. Residents are reminded to make sure your grass is cut before it reaches 8 inches in height.

- 2. Also, the planting strip between the sidewalk and the street is your responsibility to maintain
- 3. If you are going on vacation, make sure you make arrangements to have your grass cut for you.

Be sure to take into consideration that the weather can be unpredictable, but the grass still needs to be cut.

SIDEWALK AND ROAD OVERGROWTH

Spring is here and the days are getting nice. With the nice weather, and rising gas prices, more and more residents are out walking. Whether they are out for a weekend stroll or headed down to the Metro for a train ride to work, they are using our sidewalks and walking paths.

The warmer weather also marks the start of the growing season. As trees and other vegetation grow, they tend to encroach upon the public right—of-way (sidewalks, streets, or alleys). This overgrowth of vegetation or low hanging branches can obstruct view, creates tripping hazards or otherwise impede the public's ability to use the streets and sidewalks. This encroachment has been deemed a public nuisance in the Town Code and constitutes a hazard, which impedes the free movement of pedestrians or vehicles. As such, residents are required to ensure that public right-of-way abutting their property are kept free of overgrowth and intersections are obstruction free.

Trees located within the first (11) feet of the curb are the responsibility of the Town. Please call if you have a question or notice any condition that may pose a hazard to the community.

REMINDERS FOR SPECIAL EVENT NEIGHBORHOOD BLOCK PARTY

1. Canvas everyone in the neighborhood to find a date that works best. Visit each neighbor to inform

them of your plans and get feedback from them at least before you are tentatively scheduled to host the event. Complete a block party survey. Keep your neighbors informed as the event date approaches and make sure they understand they are a part of celebration. A block party letter and neighbor survey can be obtained at the Town office.

- **2. Obtain necessary permits if you block off your street.** Permits must be obtained 30 days in advance for block parties. A Block Party Permit is required to block off any of a residential street for neighborhood block party purposes,
- 3. Remind your neighbors 1 week before the party

that the street will be closed. It is important to keep your neighbors informed.

- 4. Place the "No Parking" signs 24-48 hours prior to the party at each end of the street with the date and time of the street closure. Town Hall can supply "No Parking" signs once the event is permitted.
- 5. We recommend that you communicate with your neighbors a week prior to the Block Party.

Communicating with your neighbors help to ensure all are notified and remember not to park on the street. 6. Your street must be clean and open to traffic no later than 10 PM.

Message from the Chief

Water Safety:

As we prepare to enjoy the warmer weather and increased outdoor activities, remember to be safe in pools and beaches. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) an average of eleven people die in the U.S. from unintentional drowning per day and one in five of those are children 14 years old or younger. It is encouraged that families build confidence in the water by learning to be safe, making good choices, learning to swim and how to handle emergencies.

Water Safety Tips:

- Always have adult supervision. Preventing unsupervised access to water, providing constant, active adult supervision, and knowing how to swim are critical layers of protection to help prevent drowning.
- Take a swimming Class. Classes to learn how to swim are available for both children and adults. Everyone should learn first aid and CPR too, so they know what to do in an emergency.

- **Download the Red Cross Swim App.** Download the Red Cross Swim app, sponsored by The ZAC Foundation, for safety tips, kid-friendly videos and activities, and take the free Water Safety for Parents and Caregivers online course in English or in Spanish.
- It is best to swim in a lifeguarded area. Always designate a "water watcher" whose sole responsibility is to keep a close eye and constant attention on everyone in and around the water until the next water watcher takes over.
- Drowning behavior is typically fast and silent. Unless rescued, a drowning person will last only 20 to 60 seconds before submerging. Reach or throw, do not go! In the event of an emergency, reach or throw an object to the person in trouble. Do not go in or you could become a victim yourself.
- It only takes a moment. A child or weak swimmer can drown in the time it takes to reply to a text, check a fishing line or apply sunscreen.

CHEVERLY GREEN INFRASTRUCTURE COMMITTEE

Monthly meeting to report progress on Cheverly greening efforts and plan next steps and new initiatives. In implementing the Cheverly Green Infrastructure Plan, your Cheverly Green Infrastructure Committee is working on projects in education, planning, and research.

Red Maple Run

Red Maple Run, or Tributary 4, is the subject of a stream stabilization project by the Prince George's County Department of the Environment through the Clean Water Partnership.

Red Maple Run runs from about 63rd Place at Joslyn through the woods of Cheverly East Park, one of the natural area hubs of the Cheverly Green Infrastructure Plan, before entering Lower Beaverdam Creek south of route 50.

The designers presented a 60% design at the May 25th Town Council work session and at the June 5th meeting of the Cheverly Green Infrastructure Committee. The Green Infrastructure Committee has pressed for greater consideration of the entire watershed, including the upland from which the stormwater drains into the stream. We understand that upland measures to slow the water will now be a part of the project.

You can judge the stream portion of the project for yourself. Just head over to the *Friends of Red Maple Run* Facebook group. You will find links to the 60% design plans, to the June 5th presentation and discussion, to the May 25th presentation to the Town Council worksession, and to the January 23 stakeholder meeting. You can learn more about the stream and its watershed there as well.

The formal purpose of the stream project is reduction of erosion and sediment according to standards set by the US Environmental Protection Agency. The project is also supposed to restore stream health. What is a healthy stream?

Healthy streams have:

• Connection to a floodplain

- Trees, shrubs and grasses on the floodplain
- Riffles, runs, and pools
- Insects, fish, salamanders, frogs
- Minimal streambank erosion, minimal sediments
- Room to adjust to changing landscape or climate conditions
- Room to overflow the banks

Streambanks with trees, shrubs, and grasses are important because they:

- Improve water quality by filtering pollutants and cooling the water
- Absorb runoff water, reduce downstream flooding
- Stabilize streambanks, prevent or reduce streambank erosion
- Provide wildlife habitat (cover and food sources)

Familiarize yourself with the plans and see whether you think the project is likely to have the desired result. We understand that the 90% design will be presented at the end of summer. That will be a good opportunity to bring your questions and comments to the project team and your fellow Cheverly residents.

You Knew That! ...Or Did You?

"Lacking social connection is as dangerous as smoking up to 15 cigarettes a day." Our Epidemic of Loneliness and Isolation: The U.S. Surgeon General's Advisory on the Healing Effects of Social Connection and Community, May 2023.

In his introduction in the recent Advisory, Surgeon General Vivek Murthy says, "Loneliness is far more than just a bad feeling—it harms both individual and societal health." Drawing from many decades of

research, the Advisory presents these powerful conclusions:

- Socially connected people live longer. Recent estimates, based on synthesizing data across 148 studies, with an average of 7.5 years of follow-up, suggest that social connection increases the odds of survival by 50%.
- The effects on mortality are comparable, and sometimes greater, than those of risk factors ranging from lifestyle (smoking, alcohol consumption, physical inactivity) and traditional clinical risks (high blood pressure, body mass index, cholesterol levels) to environmental factors and clinical interventions such as vaccines
- Loneliness, isolation and lack of connection had been growing in our country prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, and the pandemic raised awareness of this public health crisis.
- A wide variety of factors can influence an individual or community's level of social connection.

We will be sharing some more specific findings from the Surgeon General's Advisory in a future issue of the *Cheverly Newsletter*.

When we launched Cheverly Village in 2016, we declared its vision to be: "A vibrant, intergenerational Cheverly community where seniors engage, lead, and contribute as valued members." That vision is apparent in the Village's many social and educational activities and in the dedication to Village members by the more than 80 dedicated Cheverly Village volunteers. However, that vision is not fully realized: it will always depend on your creative ideas, whether as volunteers, as donors, or as members of the Village.
