If you are currently operating a business out of your home, you are required to obtain a **Town Residential Business License.**

Home occupations are under (Chapter 9 of Town Code) and (subtitle 27 of the Prince George's County Code) and do not include any retail business or trade, etc.

Town Residential Business Licenses are issued annually for the Fiscal Year (July 1 to June 30). Please call the Town Clerk at 301-773-8360 or stop by the Town Office to pick up an application form.



CODE COMPLIANCE

CHEVERLY RENTAL LICENSES

All single-family, multi-family, and roomer rental dwellings in Cheverly are required by Chapter 5 of the Town Code to obtain a **Cheverly Rental Housing License**.



Licenses are issued annually for the Fiscal Year (July 1 to June 30).

Call the Code Compliance Office at 240-770-7647 for an application.

The yearly rental license fee is \$100.00

NOTE: Failure to comply with Town Code licensing laws can result in a fine of \$500.

PARKING COMPLIANCE

According to Code Sec. 18-4.2 and Sec. 27.5



Vehicles that have not moved for 72+ hours may be towed; all vehicles need to be operational & legally operable on both private property and on the street.

Commercial vehicles are prohibited to park in front of residential properties.

CODE COMPLIANCE

SOLID ANIMAL WASTE ORDINANCE

Sec. 4-10 (a) It shall be unlawful for a person controlling an animal, except a seeing eye dog, to allow or permit solid waste of such animal to remain on the property of



any other person without the consent of the owner or occupant thereof; or on such public properties as are prohibited by order of the Mayor and Council of the Town of Cheverly. Prohibited areas are sidewalks, Gast Park, American Legion Park, Boyd Park, & play areas of all other parks.

VACATIONS & HOME SECURITY

Residents planning to be away for vacations should visit https://www.cheverly-md.gov/cheverly-police-department/webforms/house-check-request to arrange to have their homes checked while they are gone.

The following items should also be checked to make sure your residence is safe and looks as much as possible like someone is there:

- Cancel newspaper & mail delivery or have a neighbor pick it up for you.
- Arrange for lawn care.
- Store valuables, preferably in a bank.
- Store lawn mowers, bicycles, and lawn furniture inside
- Set lights inside the house on a timer.
- Set telephone bells as low as possible.
- Draw shades and drapes.
- Lock cars left in the driveway.
- Make sure smoke detectors are working.
- Lock all windows and doors.
- Give your house key & itinerary to at least one friend or neighbor.

GRASS, WEEDS AND OVERGROWTH



Obstructions:

- 1. Residents are reminded that with the nice weather more and more residents are out walking. Please keep the walkways and sidewalks clear of overgrowth, obstructions and hanging limbs.
- 2. If the tree obstructing the sidewalk or roadway is in the planting box, please contact the Department of Public Works.
- 3. Keep vegetation from obstructing the view near intersections.

Lot Maintenance:

- 1. Residents are reminded to make sure your grass is cut before it reaches 8 inches in height.
- 2. Also, the planting strip between the sidewalk and the street is your responsibility to maintain
- 3. If you are going on vacation, make sure you make arrangements to have your grass cut for you.
- 4. Be sure to take into consideration that the weather can be unpredictable, but the grass still needs to be cut.

PLEASE USE THE SIDEWALKS

As the weather begins to get nicer and more and more residents are walking or jogging in town, we are taking this opportunity to remind you that it is illegal to walk or jog in the street when a sidewalk is available on a road. The State law reads: 21-506

Rules for pedestrians on roadways

- (a) Where a sidewalk is provided, a pedestrian may not walk along and or an adjacent
- (b) roadway.
- (c) Where a sidewalk is provided, a pedestrian who walks along and on a highway may walk only on the left shoulder, if practicable, or on the left side of the roadway, as near as practicable to the edge of the roadway, facing any traffic that might approach from the opposite direction.

We want all our pedestrians and motorists to be safe. So, please use the sidewalks. Not adhering to the above noted law may result in a fine being issued.

OUTDOOR BURNING REMINDER: Sec. 12-3.

- (a) No person shall burn or cause to be burned any trash, lumber, leaves, straw, tree branches, trees, logs or other combustible material on any improved street, gutter, parking strip, parkway, park, alley or any other town property within the corporate limits of the Town of Cheverly.
- (b) No person shall burn or cause to be burned any trash, lumber, leaves, straw, tree branches, trees, logs or other combustible material within the corporate limits of the Town of Cheverly, without first obtaining a permit from the Town of Cheverly, excluding outdoor cooking devices.

CODE COMPLIANCE

RESIDENTIAL ZONE PARKING

Residential ZONE parking permits are now available. The price of the permit is \$5 per vehicle with 1 free guest pass per address. A second guest pass may be obtained for \$2. (Only two guest passes per address.)

Applications can be downloaded from the Town website at www.cheverly-md.gov under the Form and File tab.

Please drop completed applications in the Permits Box located at Town Hall or mail to: Code Enforcement, 6401 Forest Road, Cheverly, MD 20785.

Cheverly Residential Zone Parking Permit Application

<u>Due to the Covid19 restrictions, applications for Zone Permits will only be accepted by US Mail or placed</u>
in the Permit Box located on the left-side wall of the main entrance at Townhall.

- Permits can only be issued to vehicles registered to a Cheverly Address.
- A copy of your vehicle registration must accompany the Application.
- Cost of the Permit is \$5 per vehicle | 1 Guest Parking Pass is allowed per residence at no cost.

TRASH COLLECTION REMINDER

Sec. 10-7 Except for household trash, which the town may collect from side or rear yards, all collectible trash shall be placed at the street side or curb, but shall not be placed there earlier than 7:00 p.m. on the day before it is scheduled to be collected. All containers or uncollected trash and waste must be removed from the street side or curb by 7:00 p.m. of the day it was scheduled for collection. Upon request of a resident to the town administrator and for good cause shown, the town may collect recyclables from a side or rear yard of the property.



<u>CONTAINERS NOT TO EXCEED</u> THIRTY-TWO (32) GALLON CAPACITY.

Just a reminder, and as stated on the Town's website, "Containers not to exceed thirty-two (32) gallon capacity."

Public Works will not pick up nor empty trash containers larger than 32-gallons. This is for the safety of our Public Works employees who manually lift each and every trash can.

*In the interim, until you purchase a 32-gallon trash can with a tight-fitting lid, please remove all trash bags from cans larger than 32-gallons and place them on the curb prior to trash collection.

Message from the Chief

Driver Safety Tips (Failing to Yield the Right of Way at State Route 202 onto Cheverly Avenue)

This month, I would like to share an ounce of prevention towards a totally preventable matter - *Yielding the Right of Way*. As I travel around Cheverly, I've noticed unsafe behavior at intersections, especially at State Route 202 (Landover Road), while attempting to turn onto Cheverly Avenue. I have noticed several ALMOST collisions, with a *vehicle failing to yield the right of way* to oncoming vehicles. This type of crash/collision results in significant and often preventable injuries. Throughout my lengthy law enforcement career, I have learned that visual skills, decision making, and vehicle handling are paramount to safe driving. As most highway safety experts say, all crashes are preventable. Next time you approach an intersection, think about this defensive driving strategy:

The IPDE Process for Driving (Identify, Predict, Decide and Execute)


- 1) I Identify Locate potential hazards within the driving scene.
- 2) P *Predict* Judge where the possible points of conflict may occur
- * It is important that drivers remain alert and actively attempt to predict other driver's actions before they occur. Anticipating other driver's movements allow you to formulate a proper response.
- 3) D Decide Determine what action to take, when and where to take it.
- 4) E *Execute* With due caution execute your decision. Swiftly decide what response is most appropriate for the situation to ensure your safety and those around you. The responses should include braking, accelerating or a combination of multiple actions to safely navigate the situation.

The *IPDE* process can help you to avoid collisions and ideal practices to become a proficient defensive driver. Implementing this identified system allows drivers to react instinctively and almost instantaneously when faced with what is perceived as a rushed or dangerous situation on the roads/highways. One last reminder, Buckle Up! Every Trip, Every Time the absolute most important occupant protection device inside a motor vehicle

Which of these trees is *not* native to our area?

White Oak Serviceberry Crape Myrtle Hackberry Sweetbay Magnolia

You are right! The crape (crepe) myrtle comes all the way from the Indian subcontinent. The others on the list are native to our area. Our native plants have evolved together with native animal species and they help support one another.

Which trees support more butterfly species? *Oaks* are Number 1 in supporting these species. They can support 517 species!

The native trees on our list are among those the Town of Cheverly will plant on your property *at no cost to you.* Order now for Fall planting. You can see many of these trees along the Woodworth Park trail built and maintained by Friends of Lower Beaverdam Creek. Look for the plant ID markers as you walk.

Northern Red Oak (*Quercus rubra*), found on slopes, drier ridges*

Pin Oak (*Quercus palustris*), found in bottomlands, upland flats*

Willow Oak (*Quercus phellos*), found in bottomlands, upland fields

White Oak (*Quercus alba*), found in dry to moist woods*

Swamp White Oak (*Quercus bicolor*), found in bottomlands*

River Birch (*Betula nigra*), found along streams* Sycamore, American (*Platanus occidentalis*), found in river bottoms

Red Bud, eastern (*Cercis canadensis*), found in river bottoms, on stream banks

Dogwood (white) (*Cornus florida*), found in woods, woodland edges, slopes*

Fringe Tree (*Chionanthus virginicus*), found on moist stream banks, hillsides

Hackberry (*Celtis occidentalis*), found in floodplains, wooded slopes.*

Red Maple (*Acer rubrum*), found in swamps, uplands American Holly (*Ilex opaca*), found in sandy woods Serviceberry (*Amelanchier canadensis*), found in swamps, woods

Tulip Poplar (*Liriodendron tulipifera*), found in bottomland woods, lower slopes

Black Gum (*Nyssa sylvatica*), found in forested wetlands, upland slopes*

Sweetbay Magnolia (*Magnolia virginiana*), found in forested wetlands, seeps

Bald Cypress (*Taxodium distichum*), found in swamps, river bottoms

CHEVERLY NATIVE PLANTING PROJECT

What a busy time of year! We hope that Cheverlians are enjoying their gardens and enjoying their native plants, which take less time, effort, and maintenance, leaving more time for YOU to focus on other projects.

With all the May showers, this is a critical time of year for mosquito abatement. But we beg you don't buy into the false promises of insecticides that claim to only target pesky mosquitos. These chemicals actually kill butterflies, moths, fireflies, bees, dragonflies and other beneficial insects necessary for the ecosystem.

There are two effective and safer ways to tackle mosquitos in your yard.

1) Remove standing water: Standing water is breeding grounds for mosquitos. They don't need much so be sure to check patio furniture, kid toys/playground equipment, and pots/buckets. They love breeding in debris filled gutters! Get your gutters cleaned regularly, not just in the fall. Corrugated pipes like what is often used to direct water off our houses also make a hospitable environment for mosquito

populations to thrive. Where possible, switch those out with smooth, rigid plastic pipes.

2) Use BTI dunks or granules to kill mosquitos at larval stage: BTI is bacterium naturally found in soil. The bacterium naturally kills mosquitos at the larval stage, the most effective point at which to kill these pests. Dunks and granules can be purchased inexpensively and should be placed or sprinkled in areas where standing water cannot be avoided. BTI is safe for children and pets. Or you can make a dunk trap with a bucket, a dunk, a few cups of water, and a handful of grass. The mosquitos are attracted to the decaying grass and will lay their eggs in the dunk trap. Replace the dunk once a month.

CNPP is available to help you with questions you have. Our volunteers include master gardeners, master naturalists, watershed stewards, master composters, habitat advisors, and more! We are happy to have someone come to your yard and help you figure out what you can do to reach your backyard goals. Contact us at
